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Another Pioneer Passes Over

Died at her home one mile north of Toledo, of pneumonia, complicated with old age, March the 9th, Mrs. William Dundon, aged 85 years 4 months and 5 days. She was born in Rock Island, Ohio, in 1828, was married to William Dundon in 1850 and came to Oregon in 1865 and to Yaquina bay in 1867, and located on a homestead near Toledo where Mrs. Dundon lived continuously for more than 45 years.

Six children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Dundon, four boys and two girls, two sons and one daughter are now living. Mr. Dundon died twelve years ago, and since that time Mrs. Dundon has lived with her son, Alonzo. Mrs. Dundon was a pioneer and was familiar with the privations and hardships incidental to pioneer life. When Mr. Dundon came to Yaquina bay the country was a howling wilderness, inhabited by Indians and wild animals. The elk, deer, bear and mountain cougars were plentiful. The rivers and bays were full of salmon and covered with geese, ducks and other fowl. It was a hunter's paradise. Amid these surroundings Mrs. Dundon raised her family. She helped to clear the ground and lay the foundation for their future home.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. C. R. Ellsworth. It was one of the largest funerals ever held in the county. Pioneer friends from all over the surrounding country being present. She was buried in the Toledo cemetery Tuesday afternoon.

The pioneers are rapidly passing away and soon all will have crossed the great divide.

Dr. Carter delivered a short address to the pioneers at the cemetery.

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Newport

They crossed the bay at Newport in a row boat. They plan to stroll along the seashore enjoying the beautiful scenery and hunting spates. They will take their meals at farm houses where they can get fresh milk, eggs, butter, vegetables, honey, rich buttermilk, biscuits and enjoy all the nice things the farmers have to eat. They do this for the benefit of their health, for they are both very much reduced in health because of the close confinement to business and the hum drum of city life. They will be gone about two weeks. Nothing could be more healthful and enjoyable than a trip like this.

County Judge John Fogarty and County Commissioners Ludemann and Wakefield went out Sunday morning to examine the proposed road leading from Cape street, to Agate Beach. The road is to run in front of the Monterey Hotel and from there on the hills to Agate Beach. This road will cross a good many canyons and it will be a very expensive piece of road to build. Experience proves that when you have a wagon road on the brow of the hills and a parallel road on the beach the beach road will be traveled almost entirely because it is the best. When this road is built—if it is built—it will make three parallel roads to Agate Beach in less than one mile of each other. We are now having some experience with the progressive work of some of the people in the way of high taxes and a big needless debt placed upon the county as well as upon the city. This reckless way of going in debt without adequate returns is kept up with within a few years bankrupt the county. This means of interest is a hard proposition and the issuing of bonds don't pay the debt. The bond was invented by a rich Jew and it has been ever since it was introduced. It is not good business to have either your county or city bonded. The annual interest that would have to be paid added to the city's revenues would so very far toward making the needed improvement. We should not place upon our children a debt that they had no voice in creating. When the coming generations step upon the stage of action they will have us for all the money at their command to make the improvement then needed, with interest thereon at the rate of 2 per cent per annum from the 31st day of July, 1913, until paid, less \$5.00 paid on account of said interest, and for the further sum of \$38.95 with interest thereon from the 6th day of October, 1913, at the rate of 8 per cent per annum until paid, and the further sum of \$75.00, at 4 per cent, and costs taxed at \$10.20, and cost of this writ, commanding me to sell the following described real property, to-wit: Lots One (1), Two (2), Three (3), Twelve (12) and the East One-third of Lot Eleven (11), all in Block Fifteen (15) in Graham's Fifth addition to the City of Toledo, situate in Lincoln county, State of Oregon.

BIDS WANTED.

The Clerk of School District No. 51, in Lincoln county, Or., will receive bids till 1 o'clock p. m., March 27, 1914, for a new school house, all material will be furnished by the district and put on the ground, only carpenter and mason work wanted. The building is to be 20x30 with 12 ft. eaves, a partition to be 6 ft. from the front end to form a cloak room, one door to enter the cloak room from the outside, and two doors to enter the main room from the cloak room; there is to be nine windows, two in the front, two in the back and five on the left side; a porch in front to be six ft. wide and 8 ft. long; a flue to be built of bricks in the back end of building, to extend at least 4 ft. below ceiling and extend 4 ft. above roof; stone foundation for flue, flue to rest on 4x4.
