Creamery Paying Highest Price

The Toledo Creamery is now paying the highest market price for butterfat and expect to be able to raise the price again in a day or two. The price now paid by our local creamery is 34c. per pound, which is as high as any of the creameries are paying then besides you save the express charges. As the quality of the product manufactured by our creamery is becoming better known, it is hard for the creamery to fill its orders for butter and unless it can get more cream it will have to turn down some of the orders. This certainly is good news for the stockholders of the association and reflects much credit upon the management and the butter maker. If you are not already shipping your cream to the Toledo Creamery why not give them a trial? They now have the creamery operating on a systematic basis and can promise you satisfactory results.

Captain Wilson I. Davenny, field secretary of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, Washington, D. C., was in Toledo Monday and made a short informal address to a number of prominent citizens. Mr. Davenny is a good talker and gave his audience an interesting talk on the improvement of rivers and harbors, and what benefits were to be derived from same, he quoting many instances. He also showed his audience where it would be well for the Port of Toledo to affiliate with the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, and on a vote being taken it was unanimously the sense of the meeting that the Port Commission of the Port of Toledo affiliate with the Congress. Mr. Davenny went from here Salem.

E. B. Shumay of this city has just received a communication from the Bureau of Plant Industry of the Oregon Agricultural College, regarding lime for fertilizer. Luther J. Chapman agriculturist of Marion county and F. W. Rader, agriculturist of Lane county are working on a proposition to crush limestone for this purpose and they think they can establish such a factory to crush this stone and put it on the cars at the factory at about \$3 per ton. They are also trying to get freight rates on this material and believe will be able to furnish it to the farmers at \$3 or less freight rates. This will make the lime come to the farmer at about \$6 per ton whereas, it is now considerable higher. These gentlemen are taking a census of the farmers who will use this lime so as to be able to make a better estimate of the costs etc. Farmers desiring the lime will do themselves and the bureau a favor if they will write Mr. Shumay stating the number of tons of the lime they will use at these figures. Mr. Shumay has tested the soil in this locality and he finds it all badly in need of lime.
