ABSENCE FROM HOMESTEADS.

The act of Congress approved August 22, 1914, provides: Under the act the five months absence in each residence year allowed by the first proviso to section 2291, may, at the option of the homesteader, be divided into two periods, but no more. The homesteader must, at the beginning of each absence, file a notice thereof at the landoffice but he need not specify the portion of the five months' privilege of which he intends to avail himself. A notice of his return to the land must promptly be filed at the termination of each absence.

WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT
 Ex-President, Statesman, Jurist and Professor, in an address on Civic Duty, said:
 "Nothing is more foolish, nothing more utterly at variance with sound policy, than to enact a law which, on account of conditions surrounding the community, is incapable of enforcement. Such instances are presented by sumptuary laws by which the sale of intoxicating liquors is prohibited under penalties in localities where the public sentiment will not sustain the enforcement of the law."
