COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL FUND FOR LINCOLN CO.

Don't forget to vote YES, No. 358, the last measure on the ballot. It will not cost the county one cent more to maintain the high schools of the county.

At the June election in 1908 we voted to have a County High School. It was then the duty of the County Court to select a site for the High School and make all necessary arrangements for the school, but as it was wanted in different places the Court decided to maintain a High School at Toledo and at Newport until the people could have a chance to say where the High School should be located. A little later the County High School board thought it better to maintain a High School at Waldport, and then at Summit. Now there are some other places that would like to have a High School, too. The contracts that have been signed up with the different districts have expired, so when it comes to High Schools in Lincoln county where are we? We have been working under the County High School Fund Law, indirectly, for the past four years, and so far as I know the people are satisfied with the plan. We are now, and have been, paying \$40.00 per year for each pupil attending the high schools and if the County High School Fund Law goes into effect we will continue to pay it the same way, costing no more than at present. It may be asked why are we asking for the County High School Fund, if that is what we are working under. To this I would say, we wish to know just what we are going to do and how we are to do it. If you vote YES I know what will be done and if you vote NO I cannot tell.

There are now some fifteen counties in the state that have adopted the County High School Fund and there are a number of the others that will vote on its adoption at this coming election. Let us have it said that we, too, have the best of the four High School laws in the state. If you have a School Law read Chapter IV, beginning on page 145 of the School Laws of Oregon. That is what we will have if you vote YES on the last measure on the ballot November 3, 1914.

RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST.
