Newport

The Woman's Civic Improvement Club gave an entertainment at I. O. O. F. Hall Friday evening. A luncheon was served, a musical program was rendered and a general good time was had. About 150 persons were present. The proceeds were \$52, which will be used for the benefit of the Club.

A citizen's meeting was held Saturday to vote a school and road tax. After much discussion a school tax of seven mills was voted and a road tax of three and one-half mills. One mill of this amount will be used in opening up the Fall street and the most of the balance will be used to build the Cape street road to Agate Beach. This is a very expensive piece of road to build and it will take \$6000 to \$8000 to build it. As taxes are already too high it would have been much better to have let this part of the road rest until times get better and use the beach. The beach from Monterey to Agate Beach is most always clear.

The wet and dry fight was the most hotly contested on election day. The day was fine and a large vote was polled. The wets were the most active. The city went dry by eleven majority. One active prohibitionist voted wet by mistake and he also got three dry ladies to make the same mistake. He has not slept any since.

Everything on election day was very quiet, no disturbance of any kind occurred. About 650 votes were cast. I think all the women as well as the men in the precinct voted.

Rev. Chas. T. Hurd has resigned his pastorate here and will go to Portland where he has accepted a position as assistant pastor of the First Presbyterian church of that city. The people of Newport regret very much to lose Mr. Hurd and esteemable family. He has been at Newport several years and has made many friends among all classes of people.

Republicans Win Sweeping Victory

The Republican Party Won the Day throughout the State and in Lincoln County, at the Election last Tuesday.

Dr. Withycombe, Republican, was elected Governor by the largest majority ever given a candidate for that office in the state. Willis C. Hawley was re-elected to Congress.

George E. Chamberlain, Democrat, was elected United States Senator by a large majority over R. A. Booth.

Thomas Kay was elected State Treasurer. For Justices of the Supreme Court, Henry J. Bean, Henry L. Benson, Lawrence T. Harris and Thomas A. McBride were elected.

George M. Brown was elected Attorney General by a large majority.

J. A. Churchill was elected State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Frank J. Miller was re-elected Railroad Commissioner. S. J. Irvin of Newport was elected Joint Representative for Lincoln and Polk Counties.

A majority of the amendments lost. The prohibition amendment carried the state by something like 30,000, putting Oregon in the dry column.

In the local option elections at Newport and Toledo the dries won. In Newport by 12 votes, and Toledo by 16.

The local measure to Create County High School Fund carried by a handsome majority.

The returns throughout the State are nearly all in and the official count will be made within a few days. The official count for Lincoln county is being made today.

The County officials elected are R. R. Miller, County Judge; O. V. Hurt, Commissioner; Bert Geer, Sheriff; R. H. Howell, Clerk; G. B. McCluskey, Treasurer; Z. M. Derrick, Surveyor (the only Democrat elected), and O. R. Hollingsworth, Coroner. The Toledo Port Commissioners elected were C. B. Croano, R. S. Van Cleve and I. R. Whart. Precinct officials elected were R. E. Collins, Justice, and R. R. Gwynn, Constable.
