

The Republican Party Won the Day throughout the State and in Lincoln County, at the Election last Tuesday.

Dr. Withycombe, Republican, was elected Governor by the largest majority ever given a candidate for that office in the state. Willis C. Hawley was re-elected to Congress.

George E. Chamberlain, Democrat, was elected United States Senator by a large majority over R. A. Booth.

Thomas Kay was elected State Treasurer. For Justices of the Supreme Court, Henry J. Bean, Henry L. Benson, Lawrence T. Harris and Thomas A. McBride were on his farm on Olalla.

George M. Brown was elected Attorney General by a large

J. A. Churchill was elected State Superintendent of Public instruction.

Frank J. Miller was re-elected Railroad Commissioner. S. J. Irvin of Newport was elected Joint Representative for Lincoln and Polk Counties.
