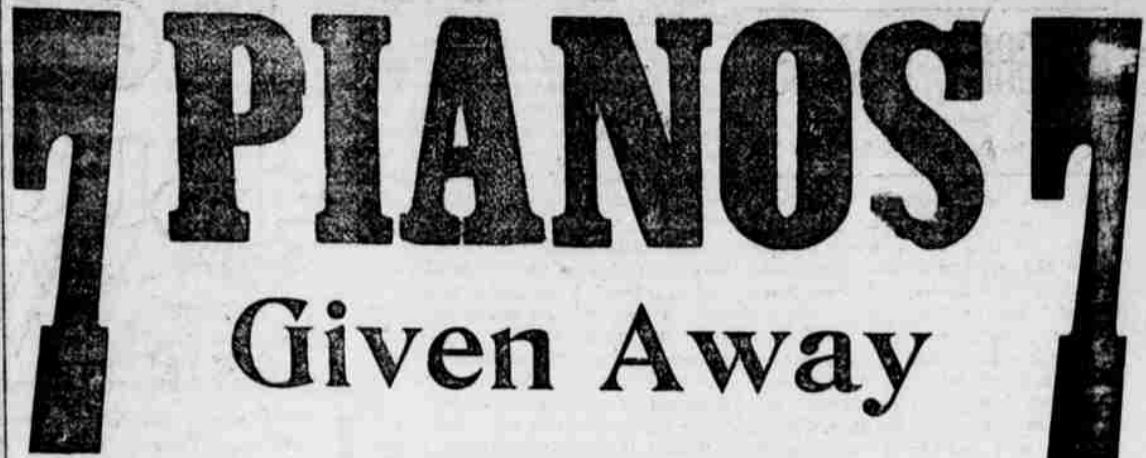
REFORM OF INSANE LAWS
Instead of spending half a million dollars on two new wings for the Oregon insane asylums, the insane laws of this state should be reformed. There should be more rigid regulations governing commitments, which are made altogether too easy and the asylums are filled with victims of drug habits and old people who never were insane. As in other states cases of mere senility and harmless incurables should be returned to their families or to county infirmaries. The taxpayers are burdened unnecessarily and Oregon gets the undeserved reputation of having more insane per capita than it should.

HIGH COST OF SCHOOL BOOKS
A committee created by the last legislature is investigating the high cost of school books in Multnomah county. The same subject should interest the legislature so far as the rest of the state is concerned, for there is general complaint.

Public school books not only cost too much but changes are forced upon the people altogether too frequently. The first text book commission, appointed by Gov. Geer under great public pressure, was composed altogether of business men. It cut the list of books used about 1/2 and reduced the price materially, giving the pupils a high class of text books. The next textbook commission was partly composed of business men and partly of "educators." This commission increased the number of books and made some changes, also increasing the total expenses.

By adding "educators" to the commission, and reducing the number of business men the purposes of economy reform arrived at in increasing this board have been lost sight of. Its functions will probably be merged with those of the State Board of Education.

One of the most expensive woods used regularly in an established industry in the United States is boxwood, the favorite material for wood engraving. It has been quoted at four cents a cubic inch, and about \$1,300 by the thousand board feet.
