A batch of ten coal land leases were filed with the county clerk for recording this week. These leases were made by D. J. Derby, G. A. Whitney, Allen Parker, Mary E. Bensell, Thos. Rixinger, Lavina Altree, W. P. Ford, B. F. Jones, Frank Priest and W. H. Parker, and all of them run to J. M. Ayler and R. A. Bensell. By the terms of this lease the latter-named parties are given the right to mine coal, dig tunnels, build right of ways, etc., on the land of the above-named parties, and the mines must be developed within five years from date.
