After lying idle for centuries and, of late years being the subject of numerous controversies, Lakes Summer and Albert, in the central part of the state, have been leased by a New York turned Monday evening accompanied by Miss Florence, who will spend the helidayers, who dicate states the accompanied by Miss Florence, who dicate states the accompanied by Miss Florence, who will spend \$6,000,000 for development work within the next two years, and that, if the results meet their expectation, from 3,000 to 6,000 men will be employed. Under the terms of the lease the state will receive royalties of not less than \$25,000 per year, the royalty to be based on the tonage of salts extracted from the lakes. The present development plan includes the construction of a pipe line down the Deschutes valley to some point on the Columbia river where a plant for extracting the salts will be erected.
