Unless there is a rearrangement of present plans, the Cello Canal will be opened for the passage of boats for five days in April, probably between the 10th and 15th, and it is expected that number of steamers now on the upper river will be brought to Portland for overhauling and two or more boats will carry freight from Portland to Pasco, Kennewick and other points. Construction work on the canal is practically finished, but little remaining to be done except to clean out an accumulation of refuse and to build a few bridges for the accommodation of owners of fish wheels and two for the passage of teams. The canal is being finished several weeks earlier than was expected, and it will probably be opened permanently for navigation on May 1st.

"Farm Lands in Oregon" is the title of a booklet just issued by the Farm Land Bureau of the Oregon Development League. It contains a list of several hundred farms and small pieces of land for sale, with prices and terms. It is designed to bring together owners of land and prospective buyers without the intervention of middlemen or agents. Copies will be mailed to those interested.

**FATHER WRITES SLOGAN SON DONATES POSTER**

1915 Rose Festival Receives Work of Art from Famous Oregon Boy.



Portland's 1915 Rose Festival has a unique poster—the most artistic ever used and it is the work of an Oregon boy, Fred G. Cooper, now one of the world's foremost artists. His father, J. C. Cooper, of McMinnville, Oregon, wrote the winning slogan, "The Whole World Knows the Portland Rose." At his father's personal request young Cooper donated the poster to incorporate the slogan. Portland has cooperated with Seattle, Tacoma, Walla Walla and Spokane in securing conventions that will bring more than 250,000 visitors to Washington and Oregon.

**SECOND-CLASS SCOUT**

To become a second-class scout, a tenderfoot must pass, to the satisfaction of the recognized local scout authorities, the following tests:

- 1.—At least one month's service as a tenderfoot.
- 2.—Elementary first aid and bandaging; know the general directions for first aid for injuries; know treatment for fainting, shock, fractures, bruises, sprains, injuries in which the skin is broken, burns and scalds; demonstrating how to carry injured, the use of the triangular and roller bandages and tourniquet. (See pages 279-321)
- 3.—Elementary signaling: know the Semaphore or the International Morse Alphabet. (See pages 229-246)
- 4.—Track half a mile in twenty five minutes; or if in town, describe satisfactorily the contents of one store window out of four observed for one minute each.
- 5.—Go a mile in twelve minutes at scout's pace—about fifty steps running and fifty walking, alternately.
- 6.—Use properly knife or hatchet. (See pages 179-181)
- 7.—Prove ability to build a fire in the open, using not more than 2 matches.
- 8.—Cook a quarter of a pound of meat and two potatoes in the open without the ordinary kitchen cooking utensils.
- 9.—Earn and deposit at least one dollar in a public bank.
- 10.—Know the sixteen principal points of the compass. (See pages 75-76)
