T. O. SVENDSEN

FOUND DEAD

T. O. Svendsen, aged about 65 years, who lived just east of town on Olalla slough was found dead at his home Tuesday afternoon by Gunder Olson. Mr. Svendsen was a bachelor and lived on his little farm all alone. He was not feeling well last week and Sunday Mr. Olson was over to see how he was getting along, and he said he was feeling better, that he had been to the drug store and had gotten some medicine and that it had helped him, but that he didn't have any money to pay for the medicine. Not having seen Svendsen around, Mr. Olson went again Tuesday afternoon to see him. He found the door locked and no one answered his knock. Upon looking in the window he saw Svendsen lying on the floor. Gunder at once came to town and notified Sheriff Geer, who, with Dr. Burgess, D. B. Stuart and F. N. Hayden at once left for the Svendsen farm. The door was forced open and Svendsen was found upon his knees with his face on the floor, being wedged in between the wash stand and the wall which kept him in this upright position. He was fully dressed with the exception of his shoes and socks. It is thought that he arose Monday morning and went to wash when he had a hemorrhage of the brain and fell over dead.

A twenty dollar gold piece was found upon the body and a thousand dollars in gold was found in a belt in Svendsen's trunk. It is said that he was worth perhaps \$15,000.

Deceased leaves a brother who lives near Boring, Oregon, and a sister at Clearwater, South Dakota.

NEWPORT GRANTED

WATER RIGHT

The state engineer has granted a permit to the City of Newport for the use of 24 cubic feet of the waters of Spencer creek for municipal water supply. The works will consist of a dam nine feet high, 301 feet long, to be built of loose rock and earth fill with concrete core. The estimated cost is \$24,000. The dam will be located in section 34, township 9 south, range 11 west, and the pipeline will be 10 miles long, terminating in Newport reservoir.
