He lived but three hours after the accident. Dr. Burgess was called from this city but found the injuries were too great and death soon followed.

Mr. Brown and family lived on Poole slough about six miles below this place, and was one of Lincoln county's most respected citizens. He leaves a large family, to mourn his loss.
