

THE COURT REPLIES

TO MR. BENSON

In regard to the information contained in the letter from Amos S. Benson concerning the disposition of State Highway funds will say: It was all news to us. In fact almost any statement concerning the manipulation of this fund would be the same, but there is one thing we are sure of and that is that Lincoln county pays into this fund \$2,500 each year and has never received a cent of it back. With all due respect to Mr. Benson and the enterprising citizens of Multnomah county.

It seems to us that a more satisfactory arrangement of this matter could be made. Undoubtedly the State Highway Commission could be a good thing and just to the entire state. The automobile has brought communities closer together than they have ever been before. And the day of each little county living to itself alone is past. There should be an authority over the entire state with power to shape the roads of the state into one system. The best means of securing this is a question to be decided. We believe Mr. Benson's suggestion of allowing a mill to this Commission is a good one. But we believe at least one half of the tax so raised should be expended under the direction of this Commission in the county where it is raised. This would give each county an interest in the state roads; familiarize the Commission with the peculiar needs of each county; and would exercise an educational influence in each county in the art of good road building.

We have been taught by our esteemed Governor Withycombe, and we believe, that it is not best to take all the crop off from a field each year without putting something back. It would seem that the Commission has been forced to overlook this important bit of husbandry.

Road building in Lincoln county has peculiarities not common to the rest of the state. Here we have the mountain, forest, deep canyons, bays and rivers, a very porous soil that is almost impossible to pack into anything like a hard surface, almost an entire lack of available gravel or hard rock, and copious amount of moisture.

We have no large wheat fields, vineyards and orchards, but a sparsely settled country of the homesteader and small farmer. We have felt and still feel that any money taken from this county and spent in more favored communities would be unjust. We would like to feel that the day when the strong would impose on the weak is past, but we have felt at times inclined to doubt it.

Yet we have a country where the forces of nature are always kind.

The past ages have left year by year an immense deposit of vegetable mulch on our hills and valleys giving us today a soil that is rich in all the elements of plant food. The breezes that sweep in from the mighty Pacific comes laden with the elixir of life that heals the sick and makes the old man a boy again. In the heart of our mountains is distilled in abundance that popular Oregon beverage—pure, cold water. Our waters supply without stint all the known sea foods that are yours for the taking. The deer and other game animals are abundant, and wherever you may turn the heart of the nature lover is thrilled by the grandeur and beauty of our scenery. Our ocean beaches are the finest in the world, and the heart of the traveler is always gladdened by the kindness and hospitality of our citizens. But we need development, and are making every sacrifice to attain this in a fair degree. We subscribe freely to the doctrine that it is more blessed to give than to receive, but as we have enjoyed this part of it so long we would like to suggest that those communities that have been receiving the benefit of our money should try it awhile.

Trusting that no good man that is honestly laboring to the best of his knowledge and belief for the upbuilding of our great State should feel aggrieved at anything we may have said, we are, yours,

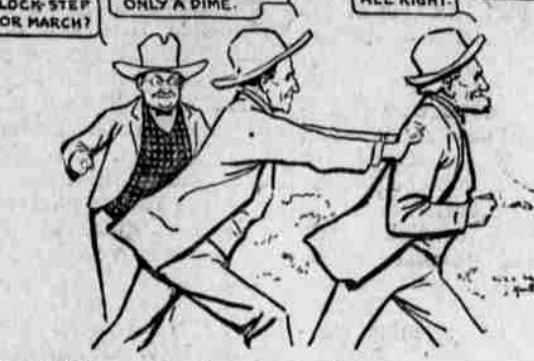
