The weather for the past sev-
eral days has been superb.

County Treasurer Hyde and
Postmaster Rich exchanged
places of residence the first of
the week.

A road is being cut around the
bluff to lead to the creamery site.
The work is being done by volun-
teers and is a much needed im-
provement.

A lodge of Rebekahs will soon
be instituted in this place. The
charter has already been sent
for and as soon as it arrives the
lodge will be instituted. This
will be the first lodge of Rebek-
ahs to be organized on the Bay.

Copeland Brothers put some
piling in the slough for the gov-
ernment works this week that
were noted for their length, be-
ing sixty feet long. They were
nice straight timbers and were
taken at the head of Depot. The
Volanta came up and towed
them down the river Tuesday.

They will be used on the jetties
and would indicate that they are
getting into pretty deep water.

Dr. Carter, L. W. Deyoe, and
M. W. Simpson composed an Elk
City delegation that was down
yesterday to confer with the
County Court in reference to re-
placing the Elk City bridge that
was taken out by the high waters
some time ago. A satisfactory
agreement was reached, the
terms of which were that the
Elk City people take the lumber
and material back to the site and
the county would pay for replac-
ing it. When the bridge is re-
placed it will be protected with
wing dams to keep the drift off
of the piling.

Sam Brassfield of Siletz was
among the Court visitors in the
city this week.

L. E. Rosebrook, pianist, who
accompanies William Rock and
Frances White at the Orpheum,
is an Oregonian, says the Daily
Oregonian. Mr. Rosebrook's
parents, reside at Toledo, Or.,
and he was a resident of Port-
land for several years. When
the Orpheum first opened at the
old Marquam Grand several
years ago Mr. Rosebrook at the
piano was the only orchestra the
theater had, the president of the
Musicians' Union authorizing
the pianist to reside in the pit
until a complete orchestra could
be assembled under the labor
banner. Mr. Rosebrook was the
first musician to introduce a
harmonium in a theater orches-
tra in Portland and he played
as a member of the orchestra
for several weeks. A few years
ago Mr. Rosebrook visited Port-
land as musical director of the
Romany Opera Company. He
joined Mr. Rock and Miss White
in San Francisco for their pres-
ent Orpheum tour as headliners.

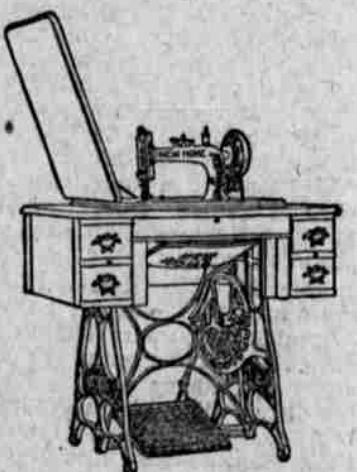
