

DEPUTY MASTER LOUDON VISITED GRANGES

Editor Leader:—I have just returned home from making my annual trip over the county installing officers of the granges of the county, and it might be of interest to some of your readers to know how the granges in different parts of the county are getting along and what they are doing.

If we will do this I am sure that the grange will grow and we will all feel better for having pulled together. If we all go in different directions we can not do much in grange work or in community work either. So come on and let us all go the same way awhile.

SHIPS' CHANNEL IN GOOD SHAPE

It has been reported that the channel dug by the Government dredge Oregon two years ago, from Toledo to deep water on the lower bay, was filling up, but this report has been found to be—as a majority of other such reports—erroneous. Government Engineer C. R. Wright has just completed a survey of the channel from the sawmill at Toledo to Mill Four. He found not less than eleven feet at low water, and the average width of the cut channel 150 feet, showing that the channel has not filled to any extent.

The port dredge Lincoln is busy cleaning out the upper end of the channel, at the sawmill where the ships turn around, and is also widening the channel at the sharp curves where the boats are liable to strike the ground in making the turns.
