RAILROAD WINS IN DAMAGE SUIT

The suit of Mrs. Effie Ryan vs. the Corvallis & Eastern railroad was tried in Circuit Court here last Friday and Saturday and resulted in a verdict for the railroad company. It will be remembered that J. Ryan was struck by the evening passenger train in December 1914, he sustaining a badly fractured leg. At the hospital it was found necessary to amputate the leg, and Mr. Ryan never recovered from the operation. Mrs. Ryan was suing for \$7,500 damages.

Marshal Also Wins Suit
 Tuesday morning the Harding vs. Nye suit was on, in which Harding, a minor, was suing Marshal Nye for \$5,000 damages for the alleged false imprisonment following Hall's between depredations. The courtroom was packed during this trial, standing room being at a premium. The jury was out about an hour and returned a verdict for the defendant. Attorney Lafferty for the plaintiff, informs us that they have sixty days in which to file their exceptions and take an appeal, and that an appeal will undoubtedly be taken.

Baynard Not Guilty
 The case of the State of Oregon vs. Baynard, the Newport druggist, who was under indictment for violation of the local option law, was tried Monday and Baynard was immediately acquitted. It appears that one of the "steel pigeons" purchased the alcohol for mechanical purposes, signing an affidavit to that effect.

Taylor Not Guilty
 Albert Taylor, who was under three indictments for violation of the local option law, was given a trial Wednesday, on one count, and was acquitted. The other two indictments are pending.

Abbey Not Guilty
 The trial of Mort Abbey, for violation of the local option law was tried out yesterday and same resulted in an acquittal for Abbey.

Folmsbee Pleads Guilty
 The indictment against Vance Daniels, Vern Folmsbee and Norman Fisher, for giving liquor to a minor, was dismissed when Folmsbee pleaded guilty as charged. Judge Skipworth fined him \$150, remitting \$100 pending his good behavior. Folmsbee paid the \$50.
