DR. CARTER COMES BACK AT STEWART

Newport, March 6, 1916. Editor Leader:—I read a communication published in the last issue of your paper, written by J. E. Stewart, prosecuting attorney, wherein he attempts to justify himself in bringing into the county a couple of stool-pigeons at a cost of \$1 per day each to look after the violations of the liquor law in this county. These men were in the county several months at the expense of the tax payers, in passing around they went in disguise, sometimes drunk and sometimes pretending to be drunk, going over the town and county hunting for violators of the liquor law, but found none.

In the grand jury room, upon the flimsiest evidence a few indictments were made but in the trial court the evidence was not sufficient to convict and the cases were dismissed, and thus the prosecuting attorney got into the pockets of the taxpayers to the tune of about \$3000 and nothing to show for it.

The judge is a very expensive luxury. He poses as a very nice man, but when you put him under the microscope you will find he is not so clean after all. He looks wise, has the mouth of an orator, the nose of a general, the eyes a kind of cross between the Fig Islander and a baboon and the head of an Alsea Injin. Yet with all these accomplishments he is a very light prosecutor. In order to get evidence to prove the character of his stool-pigeons he gets witnesses to come in from the Valley, which cost the county about \$300. The stool-pigeon has no standing in this county—not as much as a digger Injin. The prosecuting attorney does little things. Takes up cases with insufficient evidence to make them stick, and the people have to pay for it. He is a crank and deals much in matters of small consequence to the people. Backing up the stool-pigeons whom he expects to use as witnesses. These fellows get drunk, carouse, debauch, give whisky to minors to make them drunk and do all manner of mean things. This C. T. Hanners, this stool-pigeon, is the man who lied about getting alcohol at the drug store and of seeing whisky sold at The Abbey. A man who will act as a stool-pigeon has no character, and so there you are. This stool-pigeon gave whisky to minors and is now under heavy bonds for his appearance before the grand jury at the next term of Circuit Court in August. What do you think of him?

The Judge speaks in his letter of health certificates not sent in, but so soon as I found it out I sent them in. This is a small matter, but the Judge deals in small matters and it cost money. A good teacher never sees all the little things his pupils do. F. M. Carter.
