a bridge will be large and very rich.

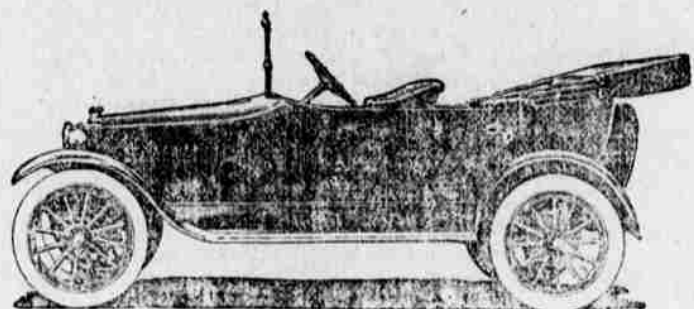
I recently was talking with a prom-
