SENTENCED TO THIRTY DAYS

Clarence Beauchamp was sen-
tenced to thirty days in the
county jail yesterday as a re-
sult of his refusal to sign an af-
fidavit. He has appealed the
case. The case was tried in
Justice Crosno's court with the
following jury: I. F. Hiser, C.
Boeckman, A. M. Gildersleeve,
V. D. Graves, Hans Larson and
E. B. Shumway.

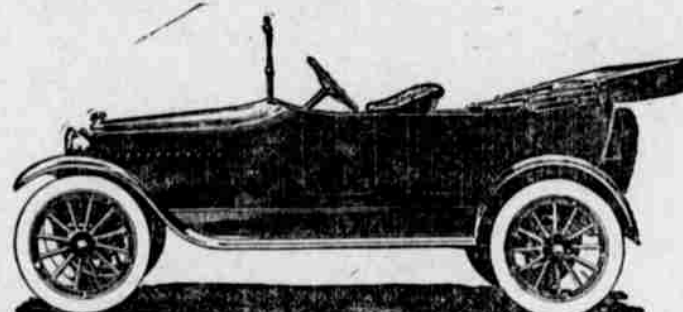
