SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a Special Election of the legal voters of the City of Toledo, Oregon, will be held in the said City of Toledo, Oregon, on Saturday, May 6th, 1916. At which time an amendment to the City Charter will be voted upon, the ballot title of which is as follows:

AN ACT

Empowering the City of Toledo to purchase suitable grounds within or without the limits of said City for the use of said City as a public park or playground; to incur indebtedness for the same by issuing warrants on the general fund of said city not exceeding the amount of Two Thousand Two Hundred Dollars; authorizing the improving, caring for and policing the same, and granting to the said City the absolute control thereof.
