

NEWPORT

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Knatt, a pioneer settler of Portland, was born in Memphis Tenn. October 14, 1836 and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Captain Stuart, May 21, 1916, aged 79 years 7 months and 7 days. She was the daughter of the late Captain Levi Knatt of whom Knatt Street in Portland is named.

She crossed the plains in 1853 with her parents Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham. The remains were taken to Portland Monday and was interred in the Lone Fir Cemetery, East Portland. The body was accompanied to Portland by her two daughters, Mrs. Bingham and Mrs. Captain Stuart, Captain Stuart is in Portland under the care of a specialist.

The class is one of the best ever graduated at this institution and no doubt the Auditorium will be crowded to witness the exercises.

Prof. Colman taught the eight grade, and the good work shows for its self, only forty-one of the eight grade pupils in the County passed the examination and of this number, Newport had twenty-one. Prof. Artman spoke encouraging words to the Class and also commended the patrons of the school for the great interest they had taken in making the school a success. The Class was showered with bouquets and congratulations. The Auditorium was seated to capacity.
