Mrs. Byers and children arrived Monday from Newberg. They have moved onto their old place above town.

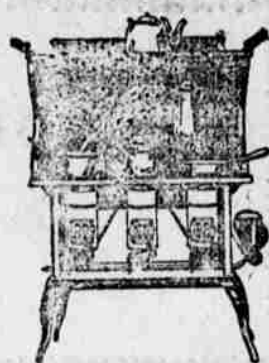
Miss Goldie Bissell returned to her home at Dallas this morning after a week's visit with Miss Clara Larson in this city.

Larger postal savings will now be accepted at the post office. This is made possible by an important amendment to the Postal Savings Act just approved by President Wilson. A postal savings depositor may now have an account amounting to \$1,000 upon which interest will be paid. Formerly \$500 was the maximum amount he could have to his credit. This enlargement of postal savings facilities will be very gratifying to thousands of depositors who have already reached the old \$500 limit and are anxious to entrust more of their savings to Uncle Sam. Another feature of the amendment that will avoid further embarrassment to the public and to the postal officials is the doing away with the limit on the amount that could be accepted from a depositor monthly. Under the old law only \$100 could be deposited in a calendar month. The amendment abolishes this restriction. While the Postal Savings System has already proved a signal success as is shown by the fact that more than half-a-million depositors have over eighty million dollars standing to their credit, still it has fallen short of meeting the full demands of the public because of the restrictions which have now been eliminated. Postmaster General Burleson and Third Assistant Postmaster General Dockery have been tireless in their efforts to secure a modification of the limitations and the new liberalizing legislation is particularly gratifying to them.

The logging and sawmill industries were going to grow to unheard-of proportions, and things were surely going to hum. All these ideas were based on nothing but rumors.

Now the camp and mill have shut down. Toledo is already a dead town, with everyone wearing a solemn expression. The rest of the county is fast being affected. Indeed, I have felt the need of a little cash myself, as I have not even the price of a shave, and my much-talked-of whiskers need to be harvested very much.

It seems to me that the farmers and ranchers of our county should be encouraged to enrich the commonwealth more than they do. When the lumber industry is dead the whole county is also. This should not be. With this country's sublime climate and rich soil there should be many men employed on the dairies, farms, etc.
