

AUTO ACCIDENTS

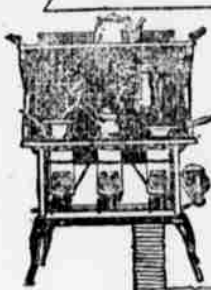

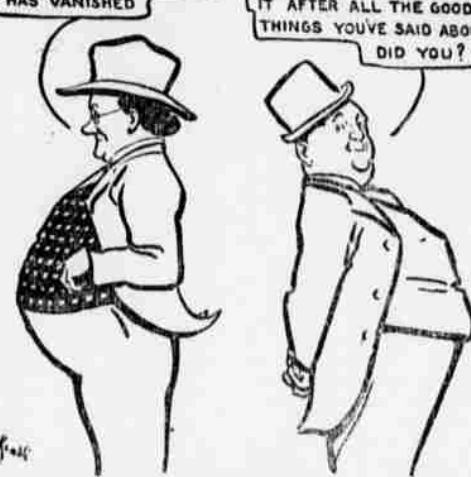
