If each one waits for the other we will simply keep on drifting until we all drift under the sod. Let some one step forward who can lead the movement, and we will all be right there ready to back the play to the limit, ready to push along any scheme that will help move our town forward and speed our business up. If you know of an ideal leader, tell him so,—punch him and wake him up, start him to doing something, then do your share to encourage and help him along. If you are the one for a leader step out and let us see you, and if you have an idea that will help promote our progress, take off your old felt hat and let it percolate to the outside. Let us discuss it and while we are not yet agreed with you we are glad to know that the collision of factions generate light as well as heat, and it is as well for us to consume ourselves in a revolutionary fire as it is to simply petrify and just drift. Somewhere we have an idea concealed on the premises that a stirring movement along these lines could be developed by the Toledo Commercial Club which would have the co-operation of the Woman's Civic Club. "Read them."

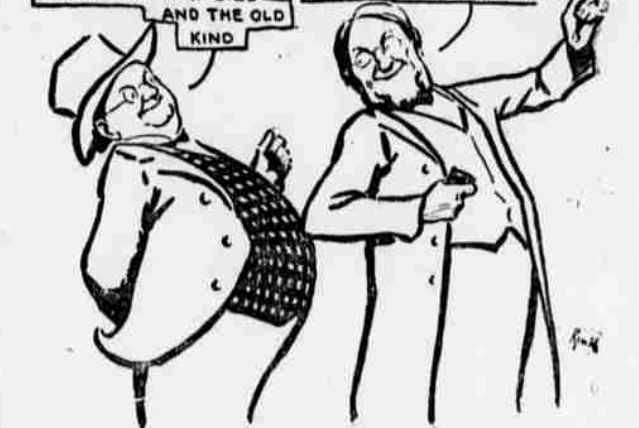
Wonderingly the girl obeyed. The first read:
