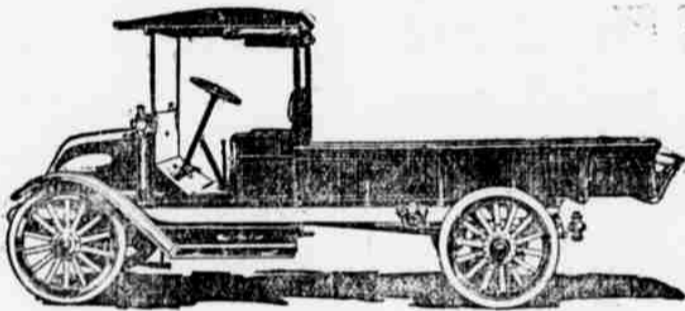

GEORGE MITTY WRITES

Salem, Oregon, July 17, 1916.
Editor Lincoln County Leader:
Toledo, Oregon.

Dear Sir and Friend:
This is a copy of a letter sent to your assessor and would request that you publish same so as to get it before the people.

I have been informed that the members of the Lincoln County Court are considering the problem of having the timber of the county cruised, for assessment purposes; and that action regarding the matter, will be a question for decision of the court during the session next month.

I hope you are in favor of such an up-to-date, business method of securing assessment valuations, and will appear before the court as an advocate of such procedure; for it is the only practical and efficient method, whereby, you or any-one else, can acquire sufficient knowledge regarding timber values, to make an assessment roll, approximately near a basis of fairness, equity and justice; and I say this without meaning any reflection upon your intelligence, ability, or intent of fairness, in performing your duties as assessor.

As undisputable proof of the truth of my preceding statement, I would call your attention to the fact, that whenever, either a practical timber buyer, contemplates making a purchase, or an owner offers for sale, a tract of timber, each and everyone of them, invariably, secures a cruise of the particular tract they desire to buy or sell; and their sole object in pursuing such a course, is for the purpose of gaining sufficient information and knowledge, to form intelligent judgment regarding its valuation. Further, I will venture to say that if you or any member of the Lincoln County Court, were privately dealing in timber, you would pursue the same course, for the simple reason that business efficiency requires it.

Now if it is absolutely necessary to have the timber cruised, in order to attain an acceptable commercial basis of valuation, in private business transactions and I defy anyone to produce any conclusive evidence to the contrary, then it is certainly just as essential to pursue the same course to gain a just and equitable basis of valuation for public purposes.

In fact such a course of procedure, is pursued in public affairs, to a great extent, at the present time. For instance, whenever the Interior Dept. of our federal government has occasion to dispose of any matured timber within the boundaries of a national forest reserve, a cruise is made of the same, and the cruised amounts are mentioned in the advertisements for competitive bids of purchase.

In fact such is the universal course followed in selling or buying timber, regardless of whether it may be a private or public business transaction.

Yet, while we find such is the universal way, of attaining a basis of valuation for the transfer of ownership of timber, when it comes to securing assessment valuations, the officials of different counties, vary in their methods of doing business.

Apparently, in those counties, wherein there resides an intelligent thinking class of people, that fully realize the necessity of cruising timber, in order to attain a basis of valuation to make it possible for public officials, and especially the assessor, to render efficient service, the timber has been or is being cruised; and such activity within any county is ample evidence that a majority of the citizenship therein, possess a vital, animated spirit of public conscience, that cause them to strive for an ideal system of fairness, equity and justice in governmental affairs; a public-conscience that demands the development of such a situation and conditions of affairs, that it becomes possible for public officials to render efficient service in handling such business matters, and then insists upon some effort being made to render such a service.

The citizenship in those counties wherein the masses demand, and public officials are rendering such service, are a credit to the wate and are winning the respect and admiration of thoughtful citizens, generally and especially that of the non-resident taxpayer.

And further, the adoption of such practical and equitable business course tends to lessen complaint about inequitable assessments and high taxation.

I realize that there are some people who, though they may not deny the need of having the timber of your county cruised, yet will raise a great hue and cry about the expense; and claim that timber owners are paying enough taxes now; and they may pretend to shed tears of sympathy for us, but in reality it would be crocodile tears, shed because their selfish schemes and desires, regarding taxes, would be thwarted, and not because of any real sympathy for the mass of timber owners. The fact that only ten to fifteen per cent of the annual tax levied upon a large portion of the timbered area of your county, would pay the expense of cruising the same, is ample proof that those opposing such

an expenditure, would be animated by a selfish spirit; especially when we consider that the cruise would be a permanent asset to the county, and that taxes has been paid upon much of such timber land for several years.

When we timber owners, are compelled by law, to maintain a public-fire-patrol association in the guise of a private association, in order to protect the assessment roll of your county it seems to me that it would be the very acme of tax-eating-gluttony, for any official or citizen of your county to put up the plea that your county-court is not justified in spending a small portion of our tax-money of just one year in order to make your assessing system, efficient and equitable.

I hope you will appear before the court as an advocate of a county-cruise and that you may find this letter of some use to you at that time.

If I can be of any assistance to you, at any time, in creating public sentiment, favoring such a policy I will be glad to render any assistance possible.
