NEW NEWPORT ROAD IS GOOD

The new Newport road around Pioneer mountain, recently completed, is reported to be in good shape by Sherman Hayes, of the Overland agency, who returned over the road yesterday. He advises autoists to Newport to take this new road, Mr. Hayes made the trip in six hours and states that though the road is narrow the grade is good. He went over the old road to Newport.—Eugene Register.

BOND ELECTION FAILS

The election held last Tuesday to vote upon the issuance of more bonds for the repair of the water system resulted in a defeat for both measures. The first measure which was a measure to provide \$9,000 for the changing of the water pipe from the tide land to the mainland lost by one vote and the measure to provide for refunding \$6,000 lost by six votes. The vote was light, just an even hundred votes being cast.

In voting these measures down the voters rebuked the council, as it was only after months of argument and study that the council decided to ask the voters for this money, believing it to be too the best interests of the city. The pipe line is in a precarious condition and will have to be changed soon or the city will be without water. The money for this move will either come from the sale of bonds, or a special tax levy will have to be made to obtain the necessary funds.

SCHOOL AT WALDPOR TO BE STANDARDIZED

Waldport, Or., Sept. 3.—Waldport's High school will be standardized. A special school meeting was held Thursday afternoon for the purpose of voting a special 5-mill tax for the purchase of necessary equipment and the result was a unanimous vote in favor of the tax. It was also decided by the voters to include chemistry in the course of study.

The school board is expecting a number of students from other towns who are attracted by the healthful surroundings and moderate living expenses of Waldport. That our high school is bringing good results is shown by an examination, recently held in Portland, in which Miss Emma Thompson, a last year's graduate, successfully passed the entrance examinations at Reed College.—Journal.
