He could not come so sent Mr. M. O. Evans, his assistant, who is an employee of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, to appear before the granges and to speak with all those he could come in touch with. This is part of his work and costs no one any money.

Will say furthermore that I have heard of no farmer receiving any letter from outside sources requesting him to use his influence with the county court in this matter.

Progressive, well posted, and well read farmers need no urging from outside people to this as their better judgement will convince them that it is for their best interests to do so voluntarily.

If Mr. Clark would take time to investigate matters before rushing into print it might save him the embarrassment of being publicly corrected.
