WE PREDICT SWEEPING

TO OUR READERS

Next Tuesday is election day and
many important issues will be deter-
mined by the result of the vote cast on
that day. More interest centers

dent Wilson came out four years ago,
among other things, as a single term

Wilson next Tuesday.

LEADING DEMOCRATS IN
CONGRESS ARE NOT IN
HARMONY WITH PRES-
IDENT WILSON AND
HIS POLICIES

On August 15, 1916, while the con-
ference report on the naval bill was be-
ing considered by the House, Repre-
sentative Claude Kitchin, Democratic
Floor Leader and Chairman of the
Ways and Means Committee, said, "I
wish I had time to go further into
details as the enormity of this out-
rageous, insane program. In my judg-
ment when order is restored in Europe
it will be a fresh menace to the peace
and humanity of the world. It con-
demns our pretensions to international
arbitrations, and a world peace as hy-
pothesis and mockery."

In a letter to C. L. Coon, of Win-
ston, N. C., in November, 1915, Mr.
Kitchin said: "I shall oppose the big
army and navy program with all the
earnestness and power I possess."
In the first place, practi-
cally all the Republicans will vote
for it. In the second place although
I know that the convictions of four-
fifths of the Democrats are opposed
to it, many of them, I fear, a large
majority, will fling away their con-
victions on this question to please the
President and do his will.

In a Senate speech on June 9, 1914,
Senator Tillman had this to say about
the repeal of the law permitting Amer-
ican vessels to pass free of toll charges
through the Panama Canal: "It is
startling and almost ludicrous, this
proposition, and I regret that it be-
comes necessary to repudiate the Dem-
ocratic Platform which is plain, ex-
plicit and easily understood."
It cannot be vindicated and prostr-
ity will condemn it."

Speaker Clark said in the House,
on March 31, 1914, regarding the re-
peal of free tolls: "The amazing re-
quests of the President for the re-
peal, like the peace of God, passeth
all understanding."

Senator Vandaman, of Mississippi,
on June 10, 1915, discussing the ship
purchase bill in the Senate, said: "It

is a mistaken policy, wrong in morals
and pernicious in principle."

Senator Overman in a speech in the
Senate on August 6, 1916, said: "The
proposed child labor legislation should
be submitted to the States in the
form of a constitutional amendment.
It is to put a State under duress and
compel it to do that which some States
have done in order to have uniform-
ity."

Postmaster General Burleson issued
an order, in which he had the endorse-
ment of Secretary McAdoo, directing
postmasters in small towns to collect
checks without exchange charges from
State banks not members of the Res-
erve system. Democratic Leader
Kitchin, said regarding this: "If the
order stands North Carolina will go
Republican by 25,000. This is the
most revolutionary and unjustified or-
der ever issued by any Department of
this Government."

Representative Fitzgerald, Demo-
cratic Chairman of the Committee on
Appropriations, had this to say in the
House, April 4, 1914: "Whenever I
think of the horrible mess that I shall
be called upon to present the country
on behalf of the Democratic Party I
am tempted to quit my place. . . .
They seem to take it to be a high
joke not to obey their platform."
