WHAT IS THE MATTER WITH OREGON?

We all admit that this state needs for its development plenty of cheap capital, and for its prosperity more employment for its people.

We must eliminate the land speculator and we must turn our backs on the exploiter of industries for political purposes—payroll scuttlers.

Whether it be laws to close ice cream parlors on Sunday or laws to antagonize transcontinental railroads, they are inimical to development.

Hubert H. Ward of Portland hits the nail on the head in discussing "What is the Matter with Oregon" in a Portland Sunday paper:

"We have permitted every species of crank theorist and rascalous chaser to convert Oregon into an experiment station for every kind of governmental and social theory. Although we need money to develop our country and although money is invested only where it is safe and pays a reasonable return, we have adopted schemes of well-meaning but misguided persons which have made investments unsafe and have caused them to pay 'Irish dividends.'"

"Were Oregon a state where the land is fully developed, where home labor and capital are ample to use every opportunity the state offers, we might permit speculators to prey upon us and political and social theorists to experiment upon us, for then the loss would fall upon our own citizens and they would promptly induce us to mend our ways. But the state has been speculating and experimenting at the immediate expense of others—of settlers and investors from other states—though ultimately at our own expense, as we have been learning to our sorrow.

"In adopting political experiments and plans of social betterment, a state like Oregon, which is 'long on land and opportunity, short on men and money,' cannot afford to get far ahead of the procession. If it should, the subjects for experiment will disappear and employers will cease to provide for social betterment in the shape of employees."
