VIOLENCE VERSUS
LAW AND ORDER

Two steamerloads of the I. W. W. agitators and organizations went to Everett, Washington, to assist the striking shingle weavers break down open shop sentiment and in resisting their landing the sheriff was shot, six killed and many wounded.

When there is a contest in the United States between violence on the one side and law and order on the other, the latter always prevails. Blood may be shed in the struggle, but the outcome is law and order.

As a people we believe in the rule of law, we believe in a government of law to which all men—high and low, rich and poor, are alike subject, so that when there is a challenge, such as that at Everett, it is promptly met by citizens.

The I. W. W., if one may judge by utterances and acts of members, believe violence is necessary to gain ends sought. They have asserted the need of violence as a reform agency. They have intense grudges against what they call the employer class.

The government of the United States is one of political action. It may be changed by a vote of the people. When an effort is made to change it in any other way, Americans, with few exceptions, rally for law and order and offer their lives for that principle.

It is difficult to imagine anything of value that can be gained by the course of the I. W. W. No city, no community, will permit the overriding of law by violent procedure, for to remove the life and property safeguards we all enjoy.

GO TO THE O. A. C.

IF YOU CAN

If it is at all possible for you to go to the O. A. C. you should do it, especially those of you who are farmers. The six weeks course is especially attractive to those who cannot afford a regular course. We should all help ourselves to attain knowledge if at all possible.

Nearly all of our struggling young farmers however, have not even the means to take a short course, or, if they have the money, want to save it for some other purpose. I have heard many express a desire to go to the college coupled with the regret that they had not the means to pay the expenses.

The O. A. C. is a fine institution. The name means progress. But it costs money. This is the way I look at it:

If I go to the college for a six weeks course, it costs me at least \$50.00. I learn a whole lot while I am there. I know much more when I leave than I knew before I arrived. I go home and put my knowledge to practical use. Everything goes fine, until something peculiar turns up that I know nothing about. I need help. I can send out for information, but this takes time and receiving instructions in letters is rather unsatisfactory anyhow. Besides the trouble may be strictly local and outside authorities may not know conditions well enough to "prescribe" properly.

Instead of scrambling to save up the need money for a course

at college which costs from \$50 to \$3000, why not have a county agent to help you? If your valuation is \$2500, your taxes for him will amount to 37½ cents. Does it seem unreasonable? You will have the benefit of his whole college education (and it's a good one) for the price of a meal at the restaurant when you come to town. High taxes? How can you have improvements and progress without paying a little for them? A real simon-pure mossback is always fighting taxes of any kind or quantity. Don't be a mossback. Boost for your county agent. You need him,—tell your court officials about your needs. They are waiting for you to tell them.

As I said before, go to college if you can, but if you can't, by all means do the next best thing—get a county agent. He will cost you next to nothing and will do you lots of good. Think it over, and then go to the courthouse and boost hard, state your opinion, demand him, ask for him—but get him.
