ORGANIZATION

There is a very good editorial in the Lincoln County Sentinel of November 21 on organization. The crying need of this locality is organization, but the problem is how to get it.

Many schemes are hatched and many are good, but we must not forget the county agent in this important work. He is a busy man and whenever possible he groups his "clients" and instructs and advises them in meetings arranged for this purpose. He tells them about new ways of marketing, soils, fruits, stock, etc., and how to care for them with the most profit in the most collective way he can.

In this way the farmers are brought together; they awake to the fact that he really helps them and that they are more than just alive. When farmers really cooperate there is hardly a limit to what they can accomplish.

The agent will do much good through the Grange and such organizations and will urge further organization throughout the county. Moreover, his help will do many individuals, outside of any organization whatever, much good. He will actually help everyone, for if the farmers prosper, so do the business men, and there is more work created for the laborer.

We cannot fail to get a good man, as the O. A. C. supervises all that, even to the expenditure of the funds, under the law of Oregon. No local prejudices or "grafting" or petty squabbles will control or ruin the enterprise. He is the direct representative of the U. S. Agricultural Department, the State Agricultural College and the County. He must be a good man to hold his position, and he will be, for he is under the direct supervision of the O. A. C. and he and his brother agents are led by a State Leader and Assistant State Leader.

If the people of Lincoln Co. will not be too backward about taking his advice and helping to do something, we can expect great things.

DO WE NEED A COUNTY AGENT

Toledo, Ore.

Editor Leader,
 Web seems to think that no man can farm if he doesn't go to the O. A. C. or have a County Agent, but I have a different opinion.

What a County Agent shows you and tells you with his knowledge and judgment, how to do and what to do, you still have to learn, but what you learn with your own experiment and knowledge is better learned than any County Agent can teach any one.

I have lived in Lincoln County eighteen years and was just able to walk when I landed here and have never been out of the County since.

Have seen the most improving years of this end of the County and other parts of the County also.

Have paid just as much taxes according to the valuation per acre of land as Web or nearly any body in the County, and still live over two miles from a County road. The only way to town is by boat, when the tide is out I have to walk or wait. That is not a very convenient way to get to market with produce, many are such cases in the county.

We need more roads and outlets—better roads which will give us bigger towns and more business so that we can sell more vegetables and fruit, etc., which at present we have not much of a market for.

Web, and so many other people, think that when they plow up a fern field or some other kind of hill land and cultivate it, plant it into some kind of crop, because they don't get one fourth of a crop, with out stopping to think they say we need an agent to teach us.

So now you will say we need an agent to show us how to dairy, build barns, silos, roads, etc., which, with our knowledge, experiments and good farm bulletins, etc., are better teachers than a County Agent. A school pupil doesn't learn his or her knowledge from the teacher but from books.

Cream being nearly the only product we have a market for at present.

While it distresses me to say to Web, don't be a moss-back and want everything for yourself—boast for more roads—better roads which bring more business, bigger towns—which will give us a better market for our vegetables and fruit and other products.

These are the few things I have named that we need considerable more than we do a County Agent.

I am not conceited enough to say I know it all but I can learn more.
