WANTS PRESS
GOVERNMENTALIZED

Mr. Bryan wants a law to
control newspapers to give a
greater space for matters gov-
ernment desires published.

Every newspaper is flooded
now with requests for publicity
from nearly every department
and official bureau, state and
federal.

Newspapers receive from five
to ten letters in a day's mail set-
ting forth the importance and
value of services performed by
boards, officials and commis-
sions.

Time taken to prepare all this
matter, paper and postage, are
all at public expense and in-
crease cost of government and
seek to expand public functions.

High taxes, high cost of of-
ficialism, and constant increase
of overhead expenses largely are
due now to governmental press
bureaus.

Why should the newspapers
be asked to run all this free of
charge?

ENCOURAGE INSTEAD
OF DISCOURAGE

In speaking of our "biggest
ships," building and about to be
built on the Pacific Coast, we
should do well to remember that
Bath, Me., has set a high mark
for us and that we shall need to
go some to surpass it. The
largest wooden schooner ever
built was a Maine product. She
was the Wyoming, built at Bath
six years ago and still carrying
6000 tons of coal to a cargo. This
schooner is 329.5 feet long, 50.1
feet beam and her normal reg-
istry is 3730 tons. There are
several others of these mam-
moth vessels, chiefly six-masters
and all carrying the American
flag and some of them have paid
for their cost out of the business
they have done since the begin-
ning of 1915. There is no reason
why the Pacific Coast should
not ultimately attain the Maine
record, however, since the ma-
terial here is of the best and we
are fast acquiring the experi-
ence that is necessary to estab-
lish confidence in ourselves.

A little legislation to encour-
age instead of discourage ship-
ping under the American flag
would make the Pacific Coast
the greatest wooden ship build-
ing center in the world.

WHERE IS THE UNUSUAL?

For some time the newspapers
have featured an experiment be-
ing pulled off in Chicago, under
which a dozen or two people
have been growing fat on 40
cents per day for food.

What is there wonderful about
such a stunt?

I know a man who has lived
in Corvallis for several years,
who not only feeds, but dresses
and pays rent and other living
expenses on \$2 for a family of
seven.

This man would be afraid of
the gout if he had 40 cents a day
apiece for his family.

I know a number of college
students who live on half this
amount per day. One who has
lived on less than half and has
gained 15 pounds in two and a
half months.

That Chicago experiment is
a big spill of nothing. There
are thousands of families who do
not think of expending that
amount per individual.—Benton
Co. Courier.
