FREE FIELD SEED FOR YOU

(Special) Washington, D. C.,
January 3, 1917.

The United States Depart-
ment of Agriculture, in connec-
tion with its distribution of new
and rare field seeds for experi-
mental purposes, has requested
Congressman W. C. Hawley to
recommend four hundred farm-
ers in the First District of Ore-
gon who will be sufficiently inter-
ested to experiment with one
variety of the special seed during
the coming season and report
to the Department the results
obtained from their tests.

The seed assigned Mr. Haw-
ley consists of seventy four-
pound packages of Kansas-
grown alfalfa, three hundred
four-pound packages of an im-
proved variety of field pea, and
thirty two-pound packages of
white sweet clover seed. Only
one kind of seed will be furnish-
ed a farmer for trial and Mr.
Hawley will send the seed in the
order in which he receives re-
quests for it. Any farmer de-
siring the seed should state his
preference and should the seed
he especially desires be taken
by prior requests, state his sec-
ond or third choice.

The seed will be mailed from
the Department's warehouse di-
rect to the farmer, upon Mr.
Hawley's requisition, and will be
accompanied by a circular giving
full instructions regarding the
culture of the crop furnished.
Since a considerable portion of
the seed is intended for spring
planting, the Department wishes
to distribute it before March
first 1917. Mr. Hawley will
gladly send the seed to interest-
ed farmers upon their requests
so long as the supply lasts, and,
of course, without any expense
to them.
