THE CUSTOMER-OWNERSHIP IDEA

Making the people financial partners in public utilities is a new and popular movement.

The Northern States Power Co. has sold six per cent stock to several thousand customers the past two years.

The Pacific Gas and Electric Co. of California successfully sold millions of dollars worth of its six per cent stock to customers.

At San Diego an entire issue of securities of the local gas and electric corporation was sold to the people by H. M. Byllesby & Co.

This system opens the door to friendly co-operation between conservative citizens and utility concerns, instead of suspicious, envious antagonists. Under this plan utilities will be managed with a higher sense of devotion to public service.

Regulatory commissions will learn to have more respect for these properties and radical action will be minimized.

WOULD CHANGE LEGISLATION

Salem, Oregon, Jan. 16, 1917.

To the Editor:—
 Supposedly free American workmen, on their way to shops where they are employed upon terms and conditions which are satisfactory to them, are beset and intimidated by crowds of pickets representing organizations which are called strikes. These crowds gather around the entrances to the shops, and although they perpetrate little violence while police are in sight, they terrorize the workmen by menacing gestures and degrading imprecations. This is the situation today in Portland at the steel ship-building plants.

A slight amendment to Oregon's picketing law would prevent such terrorizing and threatening demonstrations on the public streets adjacent to plants where strikes have been declared; it would also prevent pickets from gathering in front of a store or restaurant in crowds, with banners, doing everything to ruin the shop-keepers business by intimidating his patrons and proclaiming boycott.

Every community in Oregon is interested in legislation that will help preserve order in the metropolis so that its developing industries may be safeguarded. The success of ship-building is jeopardized, although it means much to every part of the state whose products are marketed; a fruit cannery has been driven out of Portland as a direct result of long-continued, noisy and disorderly picketing in front of its former plant in the heart of the city.

It is to be hoped that every member of the legislature will support such legislation as is necessary to protect workmen and working women from intimidation because they work, and Oregon industries from destruction because they cannot be run profitably under union domination.

Canyonville—Old Levens Ledge to operate after 13 years idleness. Will install electric plant, remode old machinery and add concentrating plant.

Hermiston county proves adaptable to prunes with yield heavy and returns large.

Port Orford mills will ship 30,000 feet white cedar to Bremerton Navy Yards.

Klamath Falls—New \$13,000 steel bridge across Link river completed.

Railroad construction in Oregon during the past year includes; S. P. Co. complete Coos Bay line, 118.3 miles, O. W. R. & N. complete Eastern Oregon line to Crane, 127 miles, Cal. & Ore. Coast R. R. put in operation 15 miles proposed Grants Pass to Crescent City line, Portland & Oregon City have 15 miles in operation and Valley & Siletz complete 13 miles.

Stayton is becoming prune and potato center.

Coos Bay may be chosen for aviation or submarine base.

Donald is shipping about \$7000 of hogs each week.

Oregon's Public Utility Commission is asking no radical legislation at hands of legislature but advocates conservative policies helpful to industries. Its report shows considerable loss in net operating revenue for railroads in state from 1914 to 1916.

Roseburg will ship 150 cars of broccoli this season. Also 50 cars to go from Riddle. All go direct to Chicago.

Junction City—\$5,000 community warehouse planned.

Pendleton—Building permits for year number 243 and total \$198,953.00.

Roseburg—Platinum ledge discovered east of city causing great interest.

Salem agrees to furnish required acreage to any firm that will establish flax products manufacturing plant here.

Reported that Oregon Power Co. will make improvements in Willamette Valley to extent of \$300,000 or \$400,000.

Oregon industries have been legislated nearly to a standstill and the legislature should go slow about enacting more laws that affect property and business unfavorably such as killing fish industry at mouth of Rogue River for benefit of "sportsmen."

Marshfield—Smith-Powers Logging Ry. granted franchise along county road between Bunker Hill and Summit distance of 11 miles.

Corvallis—Sixth street to be paved. Property owners will select quality.

Roseburg—B. W. Bates and Son buy Evening News and will

enlarge and improve both paper and plant.

Oregon City—Paper mill plans another addition similar to \$1,000,000 unit about completed. Woolen mills to build big addition.

Portland—Forecasted that S. P. Co. is preparing to go ahead with formerly planned double track electric system to Salem.

It is belief of railroad executives that if railroads can be relieved of the inefficient regulation of 48 states and the Federal body and this regulation be united under one national head with regional subdivisions, a great part of their present troubles will be removed.

Roseburg—5,000 acres in Flournoy valley polled to drill for oil.

Port Orford Tribune—"Two corps of government engineers have already decided that Port Orford harbor is the most suitable port for hundreds of miles along Pacific Coast for building harbor of refuge.

Roseburg Review—"Oregon's legislators should bear in mind the fact that this state wants fewer boards and commissions and more good roads. Some of the money being uselessly spent for the former would be very beneficial if applied to the latter."
