1500 cords of Fir wanted and bids requested on 3500 cords of Fir. Additional, 80 to 100 cords of Oak 30 to 50 cords of Ash.

Coarse, split, sound wood only required and in four foot lengths (sawed ends preferred).

Oak not less than four inches in diameter and when over ten inches split.

Fir to be large and to be cut from trees not less than eight inches in diameter.

Delivery to be made and piled in ricks in the wood yard on College Campus before October 1, 1917.

Please describe wood in bid, stating first or second growth, etc.

The College reserves the right to accept any part of the bids submitted and to reject any or all bids.

Sealed bids should be submitted and plainly marked on envelope "Wood Bids."
