ter main to north boundary of
city.

Reedsport—New hotel plann-
ed.

Albany—About 50 wagon
loads of gravel being hauled dai-
ly to nearby road districts and
3 to 5 carloads loaded daily for
outlying districts in Linn coun-
ty.

Florence—\$8389 contract let
for new Coast Guard station.

Portland—L. C. Gilman, Pres.
of North Bank Road announces
expenditure of \$1,250,000 by his
road for 1917, mostly in Oregon.

Dufur—150,000 bushel grain
warehouse contemplated here.

Bend—Bend Water, Light &
Power Co. to install \$3000 pump-
ing plant.

Heppner—100,000 bushel ele-
vator planned here.

Bandon—Woolen mill and
ship yard expected to resume op-
erations soon.

Lebanon—Citizens working to
get cannery.

La Grande to have new three
story business block.

Agness—Longest suspension
bridge on Coast about complet-
ed across Rogue river here.
Main span 365 feet while its an-
chors are 635 feet apart.

Survey of Eugene-Coos Bay
highway begun. If this road is
ever completed it will eliminate
one of the worst and most used
roads in the world.

Donald sends out more freight

Oregon Electric.

Reedsport—Cold storage plant
to be built here.

International Paper Co., of
Boston takes option on large
timber holdings in Umpqua
country at \$4,500,000 and pros-
pects are for large pulp and pa-
per mill on lower Umpqua river.

Astoria will build dredge for
harbor work.

In commenting on a recent in-
crease in pay aggregating \$50-
000 a year, granted by P. R. L.
& P. Co. to platform men, Pres.
Griffith said: "The increase of
one cent an hour, which is to
become effective not later than
July 1, has been made in spite
of the fact that the company has
been, and still is, showing large
decreases in earnings. It will be
made not because the conditions
of the company warrants it, but
in the hope of better conditions
in the future and in apprecia-
tion of the loyal support of the
trainmen."

Coos Bay—During the first
half of January this port shipped
more lumber to San Francisco
than any other harbor on the
coast.

Brick & Tile Co. has been reor-

beets.
