GOVERNMENT WILLING
TO BACK ITS JUDGMENT

When a man sees what he thinks is a good thing, he backs it with his money. When the Government, after having had its engineers thoroughly look into the Yaquina Bar Project, believes it a good thing and to show that it believes it a good thing is willing to back its judgment to the extent of \$418,000.00. Now the government does not give appropriations, hit or miss any longer, that day is past. Before a harbor can get an appropriation during this day and age, the Government must first look into the proposition from every angle. Viz—As to whether the work can be done at a reasonable cost. Will the work be permanent. Will the commerce justify the expenditure, etc., etc. In fact it has got to be a pretty good business proposition before any money is forthcoming. As stated before the prospects for this bay looks so good that Congress is willing to spend \$418,000.00 to prove its judgment, providing, that we are willing to back our judgment by spending a like amount.
