BOB MANN RECEIVES
LETTER FROM WAR ZONE

Reply to J. J. Mann, Company "C", 21th Reserve Stationed at Leafort Camp, Sussex, England.
April 17th, 1917

Dear Brother:—

Just a few lines to let you know that everything is going alright so far. Well, I expect you were surprised to hear that I was over here. I expect that long before you get this letter that I will be back in the firing line. It would have been the same if I had been in Frisco or any other place in the States, I would have come over just the same. I came of my own free will and I left some good mining property behind. Alf was in ahead of me. I met him in Victoria, B. C. He is in the Military Hospital in Halifax, Nova Scotia. He is getting along O. K. and am expecting him over here any time.

I was in Liverpool on leave and could not find out where Lucy lived. Of course my leave was very short but I have found out their address since I came back here. Had a letter from Tommy Dunford. Johnny Dunford is a Sargent in the 17th Liverpools and has been decorated with the Military Medal. His, Tommy's son, Phil was killed in the battle of Kutub-Marra in the first attempt to relieve Kut in Mesopotamia. He was 19 years old.

You would hardly know Liverpool. It has changed quite a lot but the people are just the same.

I am sending you a few post cards—that I picked up around here; as for a Soldier's life it was rather tough at first but I soon got used to it.

Well, Brother, I wish you would look after the claims as I would like Lizzie's daughter and Lucy's son, Danny, to get what there is if something happens to me.

Well, about the war: it is still going on. We have certainly got the Kaiser's goat. I think it will finish very soon, of course, now that you people are mixed up in it, now. It will make it shorter. As for the soldiers here I never met a finer bunch in all my travels; they are a d—m hard bunch to beat. Well, brother, as it is quite a long time since we met each other I expect you have changed quite a lot and a little older. Have you had any news from Brother Phil yet? I often wonder what became of him. I wrote to you before to San Jose but got no answer. Well, Brother, I will now close. Hoping you are in the best of health and hoping to see you again very shortly.
