SAVE THE WHEAT

One wheatless meal a day. Use corn, oatmeal, rye or barley bread and non-wheat breakfast foods. Order bread twenty-four hours in advance so your baker will not bake beyond his needs. Cut the loaf on the table and only as required. Use stale bread for cooking, toast, etc. Eat less cake and pastry. Our wheat harvest is far below normal. If each person weekly saves one pound of wheat flour that means 150,000,000 more bushels of wheat for the Allies to mix in their bread. This will help them to save DEMOCRACY.

THE LONG AND THE SHORT

Hereafter the long and the short will be subject to military service. The minimum height has been changed from five feet four to five feet one and the maximum from six feet to six feet six. This change will add thousands to the men available for draft.

Why not wipe out regulations as to height. One man, regardless of his altitude should have the same right as another to try to stop a 42-centimeter.

The thirteen tree nurseries maintained by the Forest Service have an annual output of ten million seedlings, which are used in reforestation work on the National Forests. This is sufficient to plant 15,000 acres, spacing the trees eight feet apart in each direction.

Much publicity has been given the enlistments as privates the sons of such men as Taft, Hughes, Roosevelt and a few other big men. Lincoln County boys who enlisted are entitled to more honor than the sons of these rich men, who will probably never see a days actual service as privates.

The new Southern Pacific Building in Frisco, the largest office structure west of Chicago, is 92 per cent complete, and arrangements are being made for its occupancy. One of the first items in the furnishing process calls for the laying of 24,000 yards of linoleum which came from New York in 258 cases, the largest shipment of that commodity to be dispatched to any one customer.

The gross receipts from the National Forests of Oregon, Washington and Alaska for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, were \$644,937.57. This is \$150,000 more than the receipts for the preceding year.
