### OREGON WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Great Highway activity in all parts of the state—Industries begin to get war orders—Shipyards working on open shop plan—Federation of labor organizing farmers on non-partisan plan—Great boom in lumber industry.

July 9.—Eugene Woolen Mills have contracted for 25,000 yards of army cloth.

Linn county putting a hard top on road from Jefferson to Harrisburg.

Portland alarmed about increasing shortage of fuel oil. Many contracts expiring and advancing prices almost prohibitive.

Silverton—A farmers wool pool of 65,000 pounds sold for 72 1/2 cents.

Portland shipyard's employes 5200 men at good wages. So far imported agitators have been unable to break up the open shop system.

Salem—Work starting on new Southern Pacific station here.

Salem canneries handled 35 tons of strawberries daily last week.

Gardiner to secure a new passenger station.

Porter Bros., to move sawmill to Coos Bay and establish shipyard.

Echo—Two sheepmen will build \$4,000 houses near here.

Roseburg manufacturers trying to secure contract for millions of oak pegs needed by army.
