THE PIONEER

Once again we eagerly scan the list of meagre pioneers left to exchange tales of folk-lore around the smouldering coals of the camp fire. Men and women who came with the fire of youth but now with steps grown slow—slow—slow—

Jesus Christ said, "O, woman great is thy faith" and truly it was so to enable her to bid good-bye to father, mother, brother, sister, home and friends in the dear and well loved East to try the perils of the unexplored desert that laid between.

Of trials there were many. The fluff-duff of the hoofs of the patient ox longing for the next oasis, the disease that sometimes strewed the way with large and small monuments told the tale of heart aches.

No time to tarry—just a little tightening of the eye lids, just a little pressure of the lips, dry-eyed John and Milly must be brave covering a smouldering depths of human sorrow. The caravan moved on leaving the Indian and coyote to keep lonely vigil. How jealous the morose Indian watched these brave men, thoughtful women, untrammelled youths, carefree maids and little children as they passed in review, they the actors, he the critic. The splendid horses, the numerous cattle, the caparisons and accoutrements, and the fair maid of civilization tantalized the eye of this Bedouin of the American Desert. All was incomprehensible to him. No more does southern Europe understand the invasion of that tiny rodent the Lemming or the Kansan appreciate the grasshopper. Nor do the rank and file comprehend the stated appearance of Halley's Comet.

How then could the untutored Indian comprehend the sudden apparition of myriad pale faces all bent upon conquest and the lure of gold? Can you picture it? I can as plain as day—I see in my mind's eye my Irish-American father in the flush of sturdy youth and my Ohio mother young and gay enjoying with mental enthusiasm wonderful sights of strangely fashioned rocks, hills, lakes and rivers. Herds of buffalo, fleet antelope and the sage hen and the varied tribes widened the vista of understanding. Life long and fraternal friendships took root and sprang up. After the long, long journey—separation. Each going their own way in order to build up as it were the bulwarks of our great common wealth. Ah! dear pioneer small wonder that we revere thee. No small deed to sacrifice self for on coming generations numerous as the sands of the sea. Stinted of cultivated fruits and flowers: the long waits between the poor thin little letters brought by means of the pony express (so accurately described by Mark Twain) for between that time and the iron-horse, Ben Holiday's coaches and the route by the isthmus were the only means of transportation in the flesh. To all intents and purposes our pioneers had died to their friends in the East. Their complete isolation here by the western sea appeals to me. How good they were and patient. Of such is genius born. Here by this western sea genius is in rapport; the very ether is sweet and long drawn out with music. The evening breezes wafted by the Pacific faintly perfumed from oriental shores, the murmur of the wimpling streams, the tum-tum of the cataract or the basso profundo of the sea drumming among the caverns and lapping the shores of our early isolation had all the constituents of the countries that produced an Ole Bull, a Grieg or a Sinding. So much for music. The blending of the sunrise or the setting into the purpling sea, the hills clothed with maple, the syringa, the rhododendron, the dog wood and the Oregon grape; the splendid forests hoary with bearded mosses, old man Hood lordling over all—so much for painting and these twain are parents of the poet. What then? Homer Davenport world famed cartoonist dreamed dreams on Silver Creek.

Sam Simpson built his own monument from rainbow lines of the Willamette and the pedestal from the rush of many waters. Mrs. Victor caught and held the vastness of old Columbia until we'd feign borrow another two eyes. Later Eva Emery Dye came from the East to get us by flash light. It is no shame to come from the East—The Little Master was of the East, but here by the western sea like the giant firs we stretch out our arms towards infinity. The mountains immutable speak to us while the Oregon quail pipes us home at rosy sunset.

To Catherine Coburn, Abigail Scott Duniway, Noble Randall, J. T. Apperson, Frances Holmes and my father, pioneers gone before with whom my child life was interwoven I dedicate these thoughts.

SERGEANT WM. SOULE

The following item was taken from the Emporia, Kansas Times, and relates to our former townsman, W. W. Soule.

Sergeants Soule, Dunlap, Ostrander and Hendron, army officers sent here from Wichita army headquarters, are recruiting for the general army departments and will be here till Thursday. Serg. Soule authorizes us to state that any who are in the conscript registration list may volunteer and enlist in either of the four army departments, namely, infantry, signal corps, quartermaster's and medical departments, up till the time that official notice to appear before the examining board has been served, thus giving men the chance of selecting their own choice of service in volunteer army till the eleventh hour, so-to-speak. After the notice is given out the chance is closed and the men drafted will be placed by officials where needed. The officials informed us that men eligible for the signal corps are telegraph operators, linemen, machinists, horseshoers, farriers and electricians; for the medical department, those who have some practical knowledge in or are versed in laboratory work; for the quartermaster department, cooks and bakers. No special qualifications are required for the infantry. No recruits are needed for the artillery and cavalry departments, these being full. Serg. Soule further stated that the army recruiting officers were going to continue recruiting volunteers for the Second Draft right away, and men in the conscript registration not chosen for the first draft may volunteer and join either of the four army departments enumerated until the serving of the official individual notice by the local examining board, the same as for the first draft.

DEPARTMENT CANNOT
IMPROVE YAQUINA BAY

Washington, Aug. 6.—The assistant secretary of war has advised Senator Chamberlain that no action is permissible by the war department for the improvement of Newport and Toledo harbors under the project adopted by Congress, but the port districts, which have voted \$418,000 may proceed with the improvements by securing the approval of the Secretary of War and the chief engineer.—Portland Telegram.
