Let us consider a few facts. When you are up against it, it is the home merchant who carries your account until you are able to pay; when you need money for the churches, hospitals or charity, it is the home merchant who helps you out. The home merchant pays heavy taxes to support the schools and keep up the streets and roads and other

public institutions. He is your friend in time of need and the money you spend with him stays right here in this town and right here in this county and helps to make it prosper.

The next time you are tempted by the fine pictures in the mail order catalogues remember that you can buy better right here at home.

You need not ask yourself whether the mail order houses would give you credit when you have sickness in the house or are out of work. You know they would not. You need not ask yourself whether the mail order houses are doing anything for your town. You know that every dollar they take out of town is preventing it from going ahead just that much.

Every time you send money out of town for goods you are directly injuring yourself. Buy from your home merchants—your neighbors and your friends—the men who are helping to make this a live, wide-awake community.

For a stranger to read our daily papers he would come to the conclusion we were on the verge of internal trouble in this country.

He would see reports of strikes in San Francisco, Seattle and Portland. Proposed walkouts on railroads. Threatened general strike to be called by I. W. W.'s to prevent harvesting of all crops in Idaho, Washington, Montana and other states. Strike by loggers and sawmill workers to say nothing of trouble threatened and at hand in shipyards. And so on in every paper he picked up.

Just at present the I. W. W. is the most serious menace. How a lawless organization of this kind can go over the country and terrorize communities, destroy property, prevent harvesting of crops, etc., etc., and get away with it, puzzles law abiding citizens.

This class of cattle who wish to do nothing but fight should be given places in the front rank of our army and not be left here at home to hamper production in our mines, shipyards, logging camps, on the farms and in other lines of industry.

These men do not want work. They wish to live off the toil of others and at the same time tell the other fellow how he must work. Oregon shipyards alone need thousands of workmen which they cannot get.

They pay no taxes, employ no labor, produce nothing but trouble and live in the fat of the land. If they were offered \$10.00 a day to work they would want \$20.00 and so on.

This country is too good for them and they should be sent to foreign parts more suited to their ideas.

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, The Common Council of the City of Toledo by its Ordinance No. 148 duly passed on the 11th day of June, 1917, and approved by the mayor on the same day, and thereafter duly posted as required by law, submitted to the legal voters of said city at a special election duly called and held in said city on the 13th day of August, 1917, a measure, the ballot title of which is as follows:

AN ACT to amend the charter of the City of Toledo, entitled, "An Act to incorporate the City of Toledo, Lincoln County, Oregon" filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 18, 1905, by adding thereto section 75 which said section provides for an issue of bonds in the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) for procuring funds for making improvements to the city water system. And,

WHEREAS, The Common Council of the City of Toledo by its Ordinance No. 149 duly passed on the 11th day of June, 1917, and approved by the mayor on the same date, and thereafter duly posted as required by law, submitted to the legal voters of said city at said special election held in said city on the 13th day of August 1917, a measure, the ballot title of which is as follows:

AN ACT to amend the charter of the City of Toledo entitled "An Act to incorporate the City of Toledo, Lincoln County, Oregon" filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 18, 1905, by adding thereto section

76 which provides for on issue of bonds in a sum not to exceed nine thousand dollars (\$9,000) for funding the outstanding warrant indebtedness of said city and validating said indebtedness. And,

WHEREAS, The Common Council of the City of Toledo by its Ordinance No. 150 duly passed on the 11th day of June 1917, and approved by the mayor on said date, and thereafter duly posted as by law required, submitted to the legal voters of said city at said special election held in said city on the 13th day of August 1917, a measure, the ballot title of which is as follows:

AN ACT to amend the charter of the City of Toledo entitled "An Act to incorporate the City of Toledo, Lincoln County, Oregon" filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 18, 1905, by adding thereto section 77 which provides for an issue of bonds in the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) to refund a like amount of Water Bonds now redeemable heretofore issued to Toledo Water & Electric Light Company. And,

WHEREAS said election was duly and legally held and the returns thereof duly and legally made and canvassed, and as said election, as shown by the returns thereof and the canvass of said returns, the vote upon the three measures above set was as follows:

Whole number of votes cast, 80 for first measure; 80 for second measure; 76 for the third measure. Number of votes cast in favor of the first measure 64; for the second measure 63; for the third measure 54. Number of votes cast against the adoption of the first measure 16; second measure 17; third measure 22. And,

WHEREAS said measure and each of them were approved by a majority of the legal voters of said city voting thereon at said election,

NOW THEREFORE, I, R. D. Burgess, the duly elected, qualified and acting Mayor of the City of Toledo, do by this proclamation declare the result of said election as hereinbefore stated, and that the said measures, and each of them, the ballot titles of which are as above set out, were approved by a majority of the votes cast thereon and each of them at said election and do accordingly hereby declare said measures and each of them to be in full force and effect as a part of the Charter of said City of Toledo from the date of this proclamation.

INFORMATION OF INTEREST TO THOSE OF MILITARY AGE

The following information was obtained from the Adjutant General's Office, Portland and is authentic.

The men called out in the first draft from Oregon will be mobilized within the state directly under the supervision of the local exemption boards in each county.

Each local board will attend personally to the assembling, subsistence, and finally, the entrainment for the mobilization camp, of all the men called to the colors from its county or district.

Plans of the War Department provide for the mobilization of men drawn in the first draft, in four installments during September and early October.

Thirty per cent of the net quota of each county will be called out in September 5th. Another 30 per cent is to be called on September 15th, a third 30 per cent on September 30th, and the final 10 per cent as soon thereafter as practicable.

The first preliminary to actual mobilization will be the notification by local exemption boards of the men in their jurisdiction who have been certified as called for service and not exempted or discharged.

In this notification they will also be directed to hold themselves in readiness to respond to a call soon to be made by the board to report for military duty at a specified time and place.

The next step will follow notice to the boards from the Adjutant General of the state to assemble at a convenient point of entrainment for the mobilization camp, a specified number of men from their draft quota.
