IT CONCERNS ALL

Let us suppose that the history of our country were to end with the present generation. Does any one imagine that our statesmen would be materially interested in the settlement of the questions in dispute? Hardly.

It is to the credit of the American people that they have always had a clear vision of the duty of the present generation to posterity. That vision was responsible for the Revolutionary war. It was the stimulus in the war of 1812. And when the Mexican question assumed grave proportions the same thought was at the fore in the national mind. Not so much the interest of our posterity as that of our fellow man was the stimulus in the brush with Spain. But throughout her whole life this country has never failed to place the true interests of posterity before present ease and comfort.

What can be said, then, of the young man or woman who is not concerned over the outcome of this struggle? That they have no concern for the best interests of their own. Present ease and comfort weighs more with them than the future of their children, or of the race in general.

No nation of people can ever come into their own until present can be subordinated to future. No present is ever entirely what it should or could be. By the sacrifice of the present we stand a chance of realizing on the future. If all else is to be subordinated to the present, there is every possibility of there being no future worthy of the name.

INFORMATION OF INTEREST TO THOSE OF MILITARY AGE

The following information was obtained from the Adjutant General's Office, Portland and is authentic.

(Continued from last week)

Immediately, each local board will post a list of the men who must respond to this first call for mobilization. At the same time each board will send mail notices to each of these men, directing him when and where to report.

Failure to receive this mail notice, however, will not be an excuse for failure to report. From the time specified by the local boards for the men to report, they will be in the military service of the United States and subject to the orders of the military authorities.

After the men have reported at the point designated by their respective local exemption boards, they will be fed and provided with sleeping accommodations by the boards, at the expense of the Federal Government.

They will be subject to the orders of their board until they are actually entrained for the mobilization camp. Disobedience will be punishable as severely as disobedience to the orders of a military officer.

So far as possible they will not be called to assemble more than 24 hours prior to the time set by the local board for their entrainment. Transportation will be provided by the board.

If any men notified to report do not appear for duty, or it appears that they have absconded or wilfully failed to report, the local board is directed by the regulations "to call upon the police to arrest them as deserters from the Army and to deliver them to nearest military station as prisoners."

Before the men take train for the mobilization camp, the local board is directed to designate one of them, preferably the one best fitted for it by reason of his age, experience and character, to take charge of the party until they arrive at the mobilization camp. He in turn will appoint another of the drafted men to act as his second in command. The men must obey the order of these temporary officers.

The foregoing procedure will be followed by the local boards in the mobilization of each of the four installments of the first draft quota.

It will mean much work for the local boards, and much responsibility for them and for the men called. But if every drafted man, and every citizen, will cooperate patriotically with the boards in aiding them to do their duty, the task can be accomplished with the speed and efficiency that is so essential.

Failure to appear for duty will become equivalent to deserting from the army. Men who desert from Uncle Sam's army in time of war are not treated very kindly. They are classed in the same category as traitors. Such men will be hunted down by the military authorities, and they either will be compelled to serve, or court martial as deserters. In time of war a court martial can inflict the death penalty for desertion.

SALE OF SILETZ TIMBER RESERVE

The Secretary of the Interior has approved regulations for the sale of the United States Land office, in Portland, Oregon, beginning at 10 o'clock a. m., on September 25th, 1917, of the five sections of timber lands which were reserved by treaty with the Siletz Indians. This sale is authorized by Act of Congress approved May 13, 1910 (36 Stat., 367). The lands included in this timber reserve are described as the S¹/₂ Sec. 8, N¹/₂ Sec. 17, all of Sec. 16, T. 9 S., R. 9 W.; E¹/₂ NE¹/₄ and lot 3, Sec. 20, S¹/₂ and S¹/₂ N¹/₂ Sec. 21, T. 8 S., R. 10 W.; W¹/₂ W¹/₂ Sec. 5, E¹/₂ and E¹/₂ W¹/₂ Sec. 6, T. 10 S., R. 10 W., and all of Sec. 9, T. 9 S., R. 11 W., 3,259.54 acres. These lands were cruised by a Government cruiser, who estimated the amount of timber thereon, making allowance for defective timber. The cruiser found thereon 170,620 M feet, distributed as follows:—Douglas fir, 102,850 M feet; Spruce, 13,060 M feet; Hemlock 28,350 M feet; Cedar 19,010 M feet; Sapling fir, 6,550 M feet, and Sapling hemlock 800 M feet. For the purposes of sale, a minimum price was placed on the timber of \$1 per M feet for fir and spruce and 50 cents per M feet for cedar and hemlock, and the minimum price of the land was fixed at \$1.25 per acre. At said prices, the valuation of the timber to be offered for sale is \$146,540, and of the land \$4,074.44, a total of \$150,614.44. Purchasers are required to pay at least one-third down. These lands are situated in Lincoln County, Oregon, and the reports of the logging chances are favorable. Additional information may be obtained from the U. S. Land Office at Portland, Oregon. OREGON WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Progressive Oregon shows up with a bond issue for permanent hard-surface highways and progressive young men for state officials.

New sawmill started at Harris station, C. & E. railroad.

Hubbard—Public work here progressing.

Gresham—First State Bank being improved.

Sutherlin—Road improvements begun on Sutherlin-Coles valley road.

Vale—Construction starts on concrete garage building here.

Wallowa—New Telephone office being constructed here.

Florence — S. P. may build railroad spur from Cushman to this place.

Redrock—Work on Cornucopia Post road to start soon.

Corvallis—Baptist Church here now completed.

Cornelius—Peerless Furnace Company of Portland to install school heating plant.

Crane—\$15,000 bonds voted for modern school house.

To relieve the labor situation an effort is being made in western states to repeal the working of the "full crew" law which necessitates the hauling of several thousand unnecessary employees. Pennsylvania has suspended the act and several thousand men have been released for useful work.

Silverton—P. R. I. & P. Co. installing new street lighting system.

Sheridan—One story brick building to be erected here.

Coos Bay—Government to expend \$55,000 on road between Corbin and Hubbard's Creek.

Sutherlin—Two vinegar vats installed at Everfresh plant, capacity 20,000 gallons each.

Meacham—O. W. R. & N. Co. constructing double track and repairing bridges here.

Hubbard—Five miles of paving to be done on Pacific Highway from this point.

Legislation permitting development of western waterpower would relieve the fuel situation, increasing fertilizer production, lower the cost of paper, furnish needed material for ammunition and relieve labor shortage.

Grants Pass—Pittsburg-Oregon Mining & Milling Co. incorporated with \$2,000,000 stock.

Powers—New Moose Hall completed here.

Coos Bay—Constructing new spur track at Libby mine.

North Bend—Two miles of macadam road to be constructed on South Slough road.

Roseburg—Work begun on Winchester Bay road.

Coos Bay—Experts to make examination of Coos county oil possibilities.

Florence—Machinery purchased for new shingle mill at Glenada.

If Oregon wants its share of government ship contracts it must get thousands of additional laborers for its yards. Its up to us to get the men.

Prairie City—Shipping 30 tons of cronite daily.

Roseburg—33 miles of Pacific Highway in Douglas county to be built at once.

Toledo—Citizens plan building lumber schooner at public meeting.

Port Orford—Old Blanco mine being equipped with new machinery to treat 500 tons gold-platinum sands daily.

Many local and state tax levying bodies are now beginning on future expenditures. Hold them to a minimum and make every public official give strict account.

Coos Bay—40 families of Belgians to locate as settlers.

Marshfield—Fire department to build second chemical truck. Pres. Griffith of the Portland Railroad Light and Power Co. is showing great spirit of fairness in his dealings with men in wage increase matters and hopes to set precedent for future questions of this kind.

Lebanon—Two roads near here being improved.

Bandon has plan to bond city to start shipyard.

Portland—Spruce contracts let, Oregon mills to furnish material for airplanes, price \$105.00 per thousand.

Myrtle Point—Myrtle wood industry of this section increasing.

Gold Beach—Due to great demand for wood and small salmon catch Oregon fish canners and fishermen ask longer season.

Grants Pass—Utah-Idaho Sugar Company buying 1500

acres of Rogue river valley land having just purchased 225 acres near Central point for \$25,000.

Bend—With the sale of \$900,000 of the bonds of the Ochoco irrigation project in Crook Co., comes the announcement that active work on the permanent development of the big Central Oregon enterprise is to begin within two weeks and will be completed within 18 months.
