A LETTER FROM CANADA

Gleichen, Alberta,
Sept. 11, 1917.

Lincoln Co. Leader:
Dear Editor—

Again I ask a little space in
your paper. We have now been
in Canada two months and like
this country fine. It is getting
cooler here now and as it has
been raining for a few days we
feel quite at home—"Us Oregon-
ians." There was fine prospects
for a great crop until cutting
time when one afternoon Alber-
ta was visited by one of the
worst hail storms in its history.
From Lethbridge to North of
Calgary and a ten mile wide
strip, nothing was left. We were
just on the edge, and one mile
south of us was not touched,
but where we were living the
man lost from 85 to 100 per cent
of his crop. He had just cut
wheat one half day. It seems
terrible when your years work
is gone in ten or fifteen minutes.
Hail stones lay on the ground
four or five inches deep. We
started out with the threshing
rig on Sept. 3d., out side the
hauled out territory but have
had rain and are laid up now for
a day or so. Wages are very
high here. Men in the fields are
getting \$4.50 and board; engine
and separator men more accor-
dingly. Cooks on the big rigs
are getting from seven to nine
dollars while in smaller ones
they get \$5.00 per day, with a
helper furnished. Everything is
quite high here—suppose it is
so in the states, now since war
was declared—even more so
than ever. Fruits and vegetab-
les are all shipped in here. The
vegetables can be raised but
most farmers farm on a large
scale, hundreds of acres, that
they do not stop to bother with
gardens. One man had nine
hundred acres of wheat—had
just started cutting with six
binders and had cut about one-
half day when the hail storm
came. This is also a coal coun-
try. There are several mines a
few miles from here. I visited
my first coal mine here. Farm-
ers can go and dig their own
coal if they wish. Tho the big
coal and oil mines are around
Lethbridge and Medicine Hat.

I receive the Leader and al-
ways anxiously await the Thurs-
day's mail that brings it—"as a
letter from home."

next Monday.

George Record left for Stroms-
burg, Nebraska, Saturday morn-
ing for the benefit of his health.
He was accompanied by his
friend, E. P. Pike of that place
who has been visiting him here
a few weeks.

C. E. Brown, the Corvallis
stock buyer, drove out 40 head
of stock Saturday morning the
same having been purchased in
and about this vicinity. He ex-
pects to return shortly and buy
up more cattle.

These days we see a good
number of our citizens making a
bee line to the fishing streams,
many returning very successful.
In fact between the fishing and
blackberrying we are not able
to find most folks at their usual
work.

The Embroidery Clubs met at
Mrs. A. T. Peterson's home
Tuesday and at the Mrs. Wm.
Peterson's Wednesday, making
housewives. The two Clubs have
dispensed with the serving of re-
freshments at their meetings, in-
definitely, in the interest of food
conservation.
