A LETTER FROM FRANCE

The following are extracts from letters written by Donald Stewart to the home folks.

On Active Service.
With the British Expeditionary Force.

Dear Folks:

After some weeks of travelling around we are at last safely "Some where in France." We had a fine trip across, making the trip in ten days. There were 13 ships in our fleet and as some of them were freighters, we did not make very good time. The weather was great all the way across, only being rough one day. We were in England only for a couple of days.

We made the trip across the ocean on a big Atlantic liner and were very comfortable. I enjoyed the trip just fine and was not seasick at all, in fact have been feeling fine ever since we left Texas. There were three cases of mumps discovered on the ship before we left but they were left behind. So we all arrived in good shape. We are seeing an eye full and when we get settled and I get the hang of what we can write I am going to write an awfully big letter telling of the trip. Of course this censorship thing is new and I don't want to have my letters all cut up. We have had no instructions as to what we should not write.

I intended to send you a cable on our arrival here but we have been travelling for so long that when we hit England I was broke. We will surely be paid in a day or two more and I shall cable then if I can.

We are in a small town for a few days. I don't know how long we will be here but I don't think we will be here long. The chances are that we will be sent to the various schools for training soon.

The scenery here is great. There is an old castle near here and my pal and myself visited it the other day. It is well over 100 feet high yet, although the top is all broken down. There were four floors in it but they are all gone and only the walls remain. They are pretty badly broken up but you can see that the castle has been well built. The walls are about 12 feet thick and are made of small stones well cemented together. There are many secret passage ways and chambers in the walls. I would send you some pictures of it but we are forbidden to send any pictures of places in France. From the top of the castle you can see for miles in all directions. The country is beautiful, all rolling hills. All the country we have been through over here is made up of small hills. The houses are all of stone or brick and they seem strange to one who is used to frame houses.

The people here are the finest kind and they do all they can to make us comfortable. The children spend hours teaching us French and I am getting so that I can make myself understood a little. I cannot talk yet but I can say some things fairly well. The trains here are the funniest things you ever saw. They call them "gares" and when you say it right it sounds like you are saying "horseradish" and clearing your throat at the same time. The engines are about the size of the "Galloping Goose" and have whistles that sound like you are stepping on a dog's tail. The cars are only 30 feet long and are divided into five compartments. In each of these are two seats and ten people can ride in each compartment. There are three classes, the first class

are pretty good and the third are pretty bad. The second class are about like the street cars in Portland. The box cars are about 20 feet long and all the cars have only two pairs of wheels, one pair under each end. The road beds are simply great, better than the most of the American road beds but the rolling stock is fierce. They make pretty good speed and the express trains go through the station here at about 60 miles an hour.

Well, I will have to close now or it will be too late to mail it tonight, so good-bye, tell all the folks hello for me,

HUGH MURRAY WRITES

Editor Leader:—

Am sorry to learn, in last issue, that the "Leader" does not lead: "but is a slow second."

He remarked: "Now we know what the people want, and saved about three thousand dollars, and a lot of trouble."

Was more amazed than amused at the idea of Mr. Wakefield that we need a Co. Agent; at a salary of \$2000. When the farmers the Agt. would essay to instruct, are in receipt of an average income of \$2000, then we will favour paying some fellow, with average local-farm experience, that amount.

Farm, or "ranch," life here is so different from outside conditions that we have to forget much of former knowledge and learn anew, on Coast problems. Let us, first, use our energies to bringing about the end of the war.
