Sugar and wheat butter and meat. These are the things we must not eat."

This is way one lady has expressed the wishes of the food conservation league. Of course people are not expected to wholly abstain from these articles but are asked to substitute other foods for them so far as practicable in order to leave more of these to supply soldiers. People at home can use many kinds of food that cannot be sent to the armies across the ocean.

ARE YOU DOING YOUR BIT?

If there was ever a time to prove our Americanism. Now is the time. Our soldiers are on the battle line to help our allies to make the world safe for Democracy.

Not all of us can serve in the trenches or risk our lives going over the top across no man's land, but all of us can take part in "Hoover's Drive" to save meat and wheat, butter and sugar for the men who are fighting our battle in Europe. We are not asked to stint ourselves or go without food, but simply to eat wisely and without waste, and to use substitutes for bacon and ham, wheat foods and other concentrated foods that can readily be shipped across the water. One wheatless meal a day, one meatless day a week will keep the non-combatants in Europe from having endless days most of the time. Remember that the person who wastes food during war time is giving aid and comfort to the enemy. This war will not be won on the battle line alone, but in the bread line as well, and every one of us can be soldiers in the fight for conserving our food supplies.

Pledge Card Week takes place between October 21st and 28th. Every loyal housewife should be willing and glad to promise cooperation with the Food Administration Department. We can render efficient service by using home grown supplies, which will save transportation, by practicing the gospel of the clean plate, by cooking no more than necessary, by using corn or rye bread for at least one meal each day, by substituting chicken, rabbit or fish in place of beef and pork, by boiling and baking more and frying less.

The united co-ordinated effort of the Nation will win the War. Do your part and get others to do likewise.

SELLING THE NORTHWEST

Last winter the legislatures of Oregon and Washington and the Parliament of British Columbia appropriated \$112,000 as an advertising fund to attract tourist travel to the Northwest.

The Pacific Northwest Tourist Association is the organization for spending the funds, and the funds, and the board of directors has just concluded a meeting at Seattle where plans were made for beginning the big drive to attract the vacationists of the world to the Northwest in 1918.

One hundred thousand booklets showing the scenic resources of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia are being printed, as are booklets on fishing, hunting, golfing, motoring and mountaineering. These are to be distributed direct to interested people through the agency of the "Ask Mr. Foster" service, the largest and most efficient tourist bureau of the world. Special exhibits are to be maintained at Atlantic City, New York and in three tourist centers in the South.

Northwest literature will be kept fresh in the leading hotels and railway offices in New York, Washington, Detroit, Chicago, Philadelphia, Buffalo, Indianapolis, Omaha, Atlantic City, Cleveland, St. Louis and Minneapolis.

Forty thousand dollars are to be expended this winter in printing a series of advertisements in the leading newspapers and magazines that are circulated in the centers of population where the most tourist travel is originated. These newspapers and magazines are being carefully selected, and the advertising will be placed by a Pacific Coast Agency.

Ten thousand display cards are to be printed in four colors and hung up in the garages and leading hotels of the country.

A specially prepared invitation is being printed to be sent to all governors, mayors, presidents of auto clubs, and other organizations, asking them and their members to spend a vacation in the Northwest.

When the sections of America where snow is heavy are this winter digging snow, they will suddenly be confronted with an advertisement calling attention to the mild winters of the Northwest. When they swelter next summer, the ads will again remind them of the delightfully cool season out here.

ARRANGEMENT FOR CHRISTMAS MAIL

1. With the approach of the holiday season, special attention is being given to the delivery of Christmas mail to enlisted men serving abroad. Arrangements have been perfected by the Navy and War and Post Office Departments whereby Christmas mail to the American Expeditionary Forces in Europe and to the crews of U. S. Naval vessels serving in European waters will be delivered by Christmas morning. Without the fullest co-operation on the part of the public it will be impossible to accomplish this result.

2. The families and the friends of enlisted men are urged to observe the rules adopted by the Navy, War and Post Office Departments, particularly in three essential respects:

First. Mails to reach sailors and soldiers by Christmas must be posted not later than November 15th.

Second. Every package must bear conspicuously the words, "Christmas Mail," the complete address of the person for whom it is intended, and, in the upper left-hand corner, the name and address of the sender.

Third. Every parcel must be so packed and wrapped as to admit of easy inspection by the postmaster. No parcel will be dispatched to Europe which has not the postmaster's certificate that it contains no prohibited articles.

3. All mail for men serving on board vessels of the Atlantic Fleet and in European waters should be addressed to the U. S. S. _____, care of Postmaster, New York, N. Y. All mail intended for men serving in the Pacific and Asiatic Fleets should be addressed to the U. S. S. _____, Asiatic Station, Via San Francisco, Cal., or U. S. S. _____, Pacific Station, Via San Francisco, Cal.

Editor Leader:

I see in your issue of Oct. 19, an article by S. T. Loudon which no doubt, will be taken hereafter as history of the introduction of the Angora Goat into Lincoln County and ought to be corrected. He says that Dr. Thomas brought the first goats (he does not say Angora but I presume that is what he means) into Lincoln County and took them to the Alsea country. They were well bred and had a registered billy with them, but gives no date. I brought my goats to Chitwood in 1890 several years before there was any registry in the U. S. Then some parties conceived the idea of organizing a club for the purpose of forming a register for Angora Goats in the U. S. and wrote me to that effect. The club was organized and a man in the Valley (whose name I have forgotten) was appointed registrar for Oregon. I don't know how much of the County Brother Loudon includes in the Yaquina District, but if he includes Chitwood, I brought the first Angora Goats there in 1890. If any one is ahead of that date please stand up.
