HELPING THEIR NEW UNCLE

The fires of American patriotism are burning brightly on high mountain peaks and in the heart of the desert. Strange stories are daily coming to light, revealing how Uncle Sam's foster-children are being used by Liberty Bonds in the melting pot of a common cause.

Not the least of these inspiring stories is told in a matter-of-fact report from Superintendent F. L. Burkhalter of the Portland division of the Southern Pacific.

On the summit of the Company's Tillamook branch in Oregon, where virgin mountains front the sea, and where the outside world seems a thing apart, twelve Japanese section hands, without solicitation, each subscribed for a hundred dollar Liberty Bond. They were not much in advance of Greek and Italian sectionmen, who showed anxiety to assist in return for what America is doing for their native lands.

One foreman of a bridge and building gang on the Southern Pacific's Portland Division subscribed \$18,000 in cash, and a conductor came forward with \$6,600 in cash.

Among the Southern Pacific employees who enrolled in the Liberty Loan army was a group of Chinese section hands who numbered among them some of the last of the original workers who helped to build the Central Pacific. They are employed in what is known as the "forty mile desert" where so many of the old emigrants lost their lives.

"HOW DO YOU DO?" MR. MURRAY

Dear Editor and Readers:

I will endeavor to point out a few places where Mr. Murray's argument in the "Leader's" issue of Oct. 19 is very weak. No doubt he was sincere in his article but when a writer kicks at the County paper of his own town, he cannot expect to be called much less than a knocker.

Mr. Murray says he "was more amazed than amused that I favored a Co. Agent at a \$2000 salary." That the Agent would "essay to instruct the farmers."

I will say that there are a good many people who think all the Agent would do is to tell us how to farm. This is an entire mistake. The one greatest part of the Agent's work is to prove to the farmers that to market in a body means better prices. This accomplished they will readily see that a standard variety of crop will market at a better advantage. As is the case now, one farmer thinks if he ships with his neighbor that his neighbor might make a dollar so he sells alone. He thinks his kind of spuds or breed of hogs is best so raises them and his neighbor does likewise.

The Agent is at the services of the farmer. If he wishes to know the good qualities of an animal or if he is purchasing seed, the Agent could detect diseases of such, that might not be known to the farmers.

No doubt he could tell us how we could improve our crops by different methods of cultivation or by "rotation of crops."

I see very little difference in the conditions as to climate and soil in this county and that of Tillamook or Coos and in these counties the Agents are saving the farmers many times their expense and salary.

Mr. Murray would prescribe "some fellow with local farm experience" when the farmer's average income is \$2000 or the wages of the Agent. I will say that if the average farmer was in receipt annually of \$2000 we would have no need for the farmer's improve their methods of farming and marketing so they CAN receive that amount yearly that we do need the Agent.

He "rings off" by saying, "we should first use our energies to bring about the end of the war."

If the Government was not satisfied that the Agent would help in the production and conservation of food, one of the war's great problems, do you think they would offer \$1000.00 each year during the war to the counties who get agents? I favor the County Agent if it should cost twice \$2000.00.

I hope Mr. Murray will not be offended at any of these remarks and that we will hear from him again. The more arguments on this subject, the more the people know why we need an Agent, or vice versa.
