1/2 cup water
1 cup seeded raisins
3 ounces citron, cut fine
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup rye flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup flour
1 cup rye flour
8 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Boil sugar, water, fruit, shortening, salt and spices
together in saucepan 5 minutes. Wash cool, add
flour and baking powder which have been sifted to-
gether. Mix well; bake in loaf pan in moderate
oven about 25 minutes.
