WHAT ARE ADVANTAGES
OF TRADING AT HOME?

How many farm folks and small town residents fully appreciate what a spirit of community cooperation may be made to mean to them? Not alone can this be weighed in the scales of sentiment and civic pride. There is also something of a dollars and cents value in boosting one's home town if we study the matter from the mercenary side.

In a community that is "financially sick" it is a very uncommon thing to find the individual prosperous. This is because the individuals who make up a community shape the trend of a community up or down.

All of you have heard people living in or near a smaller town say: Our little town can't grow it is too near the city. So, with this belief planted in the mind one goes on spending a lot of the money that is produced locally in the stores of nearby larger towns and cities.

You go on failing to patronize your home town merchants. They can't make a go of it and as a trading center the home town falls lower and lower in the scale.

Local merchants become afraid to stock up with high grade merchandise after a time and it isn't long before your home town stores carry only the lower grades of goods.

Don't pay your local dealer two prices for a good article; but do give him a chance to buy in sufficient quantities so that he can supply you at the same price as the same article can be bought for elsewhere. Encourage him with your trade so that he is not afraid to carry well-known brands of goods with a standardized quality. A standard article represents the same value no matter where you buy it.

Once the merchant of your home town knows the trade of their community is back of them they will not hesitate to carry standard products of known quality for you to select from. You have the opportunity to help make your community improve. For, with better stores, comes a better town and a good town means enhanced values for any property you own in it or near it.—Oregon Farmer.

ARE YOU SUBJECT
TO MILITARY DRAFT

Inquiries from several sources indicate a possible misapprehension that the Questionnaire is not to be mailed to men who have already been induced into military service. The Questionnaire is to be mailed to every registrant whose registration card is within the jurisdiction of your Board regardless of whether or not the registrant has previously voluntarily enlisted or been induced into military service through the draft.

It is desired that all registrants who may have changed their places of abode and post office address to communicate immediately with their local board and to furnish their present addresses so that the Questionnaire will reach such registrant without delay. Registrants are bound by law to keep themselves advised of all proceedings in respect of them and failure to do so may result in their losing right to claim exemption or discharge.

TRAPPING MOLES AND
UTILIZING THEIR SKINS

Corvallis, Or., Dec. 7.—It just happens that the most destructive mole on the Pacific Coast is also the largest and has the most valuable pelt for fur.

Until recently the mole was captured to exterminate a destructive pest with no thought of saving the beautiful and valuable pelt. Preserving the skins requires the use of traps that will not damage the fur. Bulletin No. 832, "Trapping Moles," tells what kind to get, where to set them, how to set them, and how to skin and prepare the pelts for trade. Also what tools are needed in this work and how the skins are "matched" and made up.

The skin is now in its prime and more valuable than at any other time of year, so that those interested in taking the fine pelts as well as exterminating a nuisance are advised to send for a free copy of the bulletin to the Division of Publications, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

LAWYERS TO ASSIST
DRAFTED MEN TO ANSWER

Every man registered for the draft will be sent a Questionnaire in the next two or three weeks that he must fill out and return within seven days to his local exemption board.

These Questionnaires are long and the answers to some of the questions may require considerable study. But though Uncle Sam will insist that all the questions be answered he is going to safeguard the rights of every man by providing him with free legal assistance and advice in writing out his answers.

To this end the President has appointed C. E. Hawkins of Toledo, and W. H. Waterbury and B. F. Jones, of Newport to constitute a legal advisory board for Lincoln County.

So far as the lawyers are concerned, it will all be a labor of patriotism on their part. Not a cent will they charge any registrant for their services.

ONE WHEATLESS
DAY PLEASE

Dear Editor:—

I am asking for space in your paper for the following, for it was brought painfully to my attention last Wednesday evening at the Thanksgiving dance given by the Honor Guards, that all the people in Toledo had not as yet signed the Food Conservation Card, and as a consequence were not observing the day set aside as wheatless day. The Honor Guards undoubtedly did not know that Wednesday had been set aside as Wheatless Day, or else they would not have served for refreshments those dainty sandwiches and delicious cookies made entirely of wheat.

For the first time in the history of our lives our Government is asking us to conserve on food, to eat less of certain kinds and especially wheat, and to eat more of others of which we have a great abundance, to waste less, of all foods and to observe certain days especially. The great problem confronting us today is to feed our Allies by sending them as much food as we can of the most concentrated nutritive value in the least shipping space and wheat is far and away the most valuable.

We must remember that the men of the Allied nations are away fighting, they are no longer on their farms, so the production of all foods by these countries has been greatly reduced. Even before the war the production was much less than the amount consumed and America supplies the shortage, with a small amount from a few other countries which can no longer help. America has been called upon to bear the brunt of this food supply and the Allies are depending on us as they never have before with a right they never had before. They are doing our fighting for us, they are fighting, suffering and dying—IN OUR WAR.

Today they stand knee-deep in trench mud and take their sleep in muck and mire; they camp in snow and sleet and die on lonely outposts and bleak wind-swept hills; they are enduring all this horrors and the tortures of this modern war; they are constantly supplying fresh recruits for the shambles and the slaughter heap with brave unquivering hearts. Our own beloved boys who are going from us, will soon be facing poison gas and deadly flame, and will show by their endurance and their deeds of valor, their devotion to the principles of our Fathers the metal that is gold in the manhood of America. That is their "bit." Our bit is so pitifully small in comparison, to save one slice of bread each day, to save a wheatless day and to observe it at home individually and abroad as an organization. To see that others observe it too, in order that these brave and splendid men may not fight in vain.

Let us remember—that every one who is not for America now is against America, that every flag that flies opposite the German flag is by proxy the American flag and that the armies fighting in our defense can not be maintained through this winter even, if there is not sufficient food. And there can only be sufficient food if America provides it and America can not provide it without the hearty cooperation of all of us.

We each of us, have our part to play. The hour of sacrifice for our country has struck and in the crucible of a great and a common danger every citizen will have his measure taken and the reassey will be correct. I sign myself by the proudest title

the world can boast, a title which is mine in common with many loyal millions,
A plain American Citizen.
