MARK MIDDLEKAUFF
NOW IN FRANCE

Aboard American Convoy.

Well, we have had a fairly fine
voyage. We have been at sea for
nearly ten days. We do not
know our exact location, but we
went south and are now going
north toward England and
France. There are a number of
us fellows, 75 in fact, a fine
bunch of fellows. We do not
know our destination, could not
tell if we did. This is a very new
experience, one which I will nev-
er forget or regret. I am well
and happy, and as we enter the
submarine zone, we do not think
of dangers; nobody does. Con-
stant singing and laughter. I
expect to be flying at some
training camp very shortly. We
will hear little or nothing of the
war situation from now on. You
folks hear more than we ever
will know.

Somewhere in France,
Nov. 2, 1917.

This is a bright sunshiny
morning and we have just fin-
ished breakfast; we are still
aboard the boat we came over
in. From all the news we can
gather, which is meager and
without foundation, the war
situation looks very bad. This
morning we saw a large French
dirigible up about 10,000 feet. It
surely looked fine. Also we saw
a large French airplane yester-
day. The railroads here are very
antique, and remind me of the
toy railroads I used to play with;
little tiny cars that are not one-
fifth the size of American cars.
This town is very Americanized,
however. It will be a happy mo-
ment when we get ashore once
more. I was up on the prome-
nade deck last night and a fellow
came up to be and said: "Is your
name Middlekauff? My name is
Ralph Johnson. I was a Gamma
Tau Beta pledge last year and
we had Xmas dinner with your
folks." We had a fine talk. He
is with a "certain outfit on
board." I also have met several
U. of O. boys, besides four O. A.
C. men. The French kids come
up in boats and sell us apples, or-
anges, candy, etc., at very rea-
sonable rates. With love,

Eggs, fresh 30c. packed 25c; but-
ter, ranch, 15c. to 25c., creamery
butter 55c. per roll; potatoes 40c.
to 50c. per bu.; cabbage 2-3 to 1
cent per lb.; flour \$4.60 per bbl.;
bran, \$1 per cwt.; shorts \$1.10
per cwt.; oats 45c. per bu.;
wheat \$1 per bu.; parsnips \$1
per cwt.; carrots \$10 per ton;
hay \$10 per ton; chittim \$1.50
per cwt.—Toledo market report.

land at 86 cents per bushel.

like proportion.
